Delegates from the Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands Commend Mukti Cox's Bazar's PSEAH Initiatives

Mukti Cox's Bazar Celebrates Youth Achievements with Prize Distribution Ceremony



On May 15, 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar, in collaboration with PKSF, organized a prize distribution ceremony for the youth fair and upazila-level sports and cultural competition at the ENRICH program office in Chowfaldandi Union, Cox's Bazar Sadar. The event, financially and technically supported by Mukti Cox's Bazar and PKSF, featured a day-long youth fair with participation from youth club members across six unions, including the Cox's Bazar Sadar Upazila municipality.

Youth club members showcased their talents through 10 stalls and various activities, including an innovation corner, a medical camp offering free blood group testing, health awareness sessions, a solidarity corner, IEC material displays, and Deyalikha for child marriage awareness. Other highlights included block boutiques and homemade pies. The fair was inaugurated by Mr. Syed Lutful Kabir Chowdhury, Deputy Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, who served as the chief guest. Other notable attendees included Mr. Ramzan Ali, Assistant Officer of the Department of Women and Child Affairs, Cox's Bazar; Mr. Shimul Mitra Sharma, Instructor of the Social Services Department; Mr. Md. Nashir Uddin, UP member of Chowfaldandi Union Parishad; and Md. Jahangir Alam, Assistant Teacher of Bharuakhali Adarsh High School.

The guests visited each stall, appreciating the creative efforts of the youth. At the end of the day, prizes were awarded to 19 contestants from the upazila sports and cultural competition, as well as to three stalls for creative exhibitions and three stalls for beautiful murals. Japanese Vice-Minister Applauds Mukti Cox's Bazar Learning Centre



Mukti Cox's Bazar distributed food and non-food items after Cyclone Remal















On 26th May 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar handed over 500 packets of food and nonfood items to the district Administration during cyclone Remal. The items of the packages were dry food, liquid milk, water, candles Matchbox and 50 torchlights and raincoats to the emergency relief and rescue operation team. The District Administration extended their gratitude for standing by as a partner of the government with unwavering support and providing emergency relief assistance. While handing over the relief materials, the Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar said that Mukti Cox's Bazar was founded to offer humanitarian aid for rehabilitation and to ease the sufferings of the survivors affected by the devastating cyclone of 1991. Mukti Cox's Bazar is always the first to stand by for the affected and distribute relief coordinating with the District Administration. In continuation of this, the organization has distributed dry food, liquid milk, water and candles to 500 families considering the women, men and children affected by cyclone Remal and prepared more relief materials for another 500 families which will be distributed among the survivors. To mention, each package contains 1500kg of flattened rice, 500kg of jiggery, 200ml of liquid milk, 1 Liter of mineral water, 2 candles and 1 matchbox.



Australian High Commission Delegation Visits Mukti Cox's Bazar



On April 30, 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar had the honor of welcoming distinguished visitors from the Australian High Commission, including Mr. Nick McLean, First Secretary (Humanitarian), Ms. Hamah Hussain, Deputy Humanitarian Adviser and Third Secretary, and Mr. Hasin Sadab Bhuiyan, Humanitarian Programme Officer. They were accompanied by Sohel Mahmud, Senior Team Leader of the AHP Bangladesh Consortium, Md. Mahmudul Hoque Patowary, Manager-Communication of the AHP Bangladesh Consortium, Md. Mostofa Ali, Program Manager at Oxfam in Bangladesh, and Md. Saiful Islam, Program Manager-AHP IV at Oxfam in Bangladesh.

During their visit, the delegation engaged with project participants who are involved in alternative income generation activities through a community group discussion at Hnila Union in Teknaf Upazila. The discussion focused on the impacts of the DFAT AHP Bangladesh Rohingya Response Phase IV Inclusive project, including changes in income, social cohesion between host communities and Rohingya refugees, and the challenges faced.

The project participants actively participated in the discussion, sharing their positive experiences in decision-making and their contributions to prevent early marriage within their community as part of an active self-help group (SHG). Md. Khairul Islam, Director of Monitoring and Evaluation at Mukti Cox's Bazar, and Md. Foysal Bari, Project Coordinator of the DFAT AHP Bangladesh Rohingya Response Phase IV Inclusive project, accompanied the visitors and expressed their heartfelt thanks on behalf of the Chief Executive.

LEAP Project Advocates for Improved Healthcare Access for Women and Girls in Union Clinics



The government has established community clinics and family welfare centers in every union to provide healthcare services directly to the people, particularly focusing on women and girls. These centers are intended to offer essential health services, including menstrual management, family planning, antenatal care (ANC), and postnatal care (PNC). However, it is often observed that women and girls do not receive these services in a timely manner due to various reasons.

The LEAP Project has been actively engaging with government officials to address these issues and ensure that women and girls have uninterrupted access to these services. Additionally, each healthcare center has a Community and Facility Management Committee, whose members are regularly encouraged to oversee the proper functioning of the centers. This supervision aims to prevent any hindrance in accessing prescribed healthcare services for women and girls.

When issues arise, the project collects evidence and presents it to various government officials at the upazila level, urging them to take effective measures to resolve the problems. For instance, the adolescent corners in union family and health welfare centers are often neglected and ineffective. Upon presenting this issue to the Upazila Family Planning Officer, he assured that health workers would be assigned on a rotational basis to address the needs of women and girls. This year, the project organized three upazila-based advocacy meetings, attended by Ramu Upazila UNO Ashraf Beg, Upazila Family Planning Officer Sadekur Rahman, Upazila Women and Children Affairs Officer Umme Suraiya Amin, and Upazila Youth Development Officer Noor-e-Alam Majumder.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Distributes Vegetables and pond Fish to FDMN in Bhasanchar





On February 2, 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar, under its Livelihood Improvement Project for Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals in Bhasanchar, Hatva, Noakhali, organized a significant distribution event for beneficiaries residing in Plot no. GP-7. The event was inaugurated by Mr. Mahfuzar Rahman, Honorable Camp in Charge (CiC) of Bhasanchar Camp (Deputy Secretary, Additional Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commissioner), who served as the chief quest. Mr. Bimal Chandra Dey Sarker, Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, attended as a special guest and highlighted the organization's long-standing commitment to humanitarian assistance, which began with relief activities in 1996. He emphasized that Mukti Cox's Bazar will continue to expand its programs to support underprivileged communities. The event was also attended by Subash Chandra Sheel, Project Coordinator of the Bhasanchar Livelihood Project; Mr. Md. Shamim Sardar, Program Manager of the GBViE project, Ms. Taslima Ferdowsi, Deputy Program Manager, and other officials and employees. The project, funded by Mukti Cox's Bazar since July 2023, provided each beneficiary with a package containing 1.5 kg of radish, 1 sweet gourd, 0.5 kg of red amaranth, and 0.75 kg of Tilapia fish. A total of 120 families from cluster no. 72 received these packages.

Mr. Mahfuzar Rahman praised the project for its significant initiative in producing a large quantity of radish and sweet gourd in the garden, acknowledging Mukti Cox's Bazar's impactful efforts. He noted that such initiatives not only improve food security but also enhance the livelihoods of the beneficiaries by providing them with nutritious food and opportunities for income generation. The beneficiaries expressed their gratitude, highlighting the positive impact of the support on their daily lives and overall well-being.



Religious and Social Leaders Engage with LEAP Project to Promote Awareness and Prevent Gender-Based Violence



Joe McIntosh, the Development Officer from the High Commission of Canada in Bangladesh, recently visited the ongoing activities of Mukti Cox's Bazar. During his visit, he sought insights from religious and social leaders regarding their involvement with the project. The discussion centered on how the project is being presented in society and how the local community perceives it.

Religious leaders shared their experiences, emphasizing that their engagement with the project has deepened their understanding of adolescent changes. They acknowledged that they previously held misconceptions about these changes and now recognize their importance. Additionally, they discussed the impact of gender-based violence on women and the responsibilities of men in preventing such violence.

These messages are disseminated during various religious discussions, including Khutba (sermons) in mosques. The Imams Group in Cox's Bazar district also plays a crucial role, sharing discussion topics through online platforms. In madrasas, awareness messages emphasize providing proper time and support to adolescent girls during this critical period.

Addressing challenges, the religious leaders emphasized that their messages align with the teachings of the holy Qur'an. By presenting these topics in the light of religious scripture, they have gained widespread acceptance within the community. Joe McIntosh further visited the Union Health and Family Welfare Center in Rajarkul union, discussing the LEAP project's contributions and exploring potential avenues for further cooperation.

Microcredit Regulatory Authority Praises Mukti Cox's Bazar's Youth Development Initiatives



On January 14, 2024, a delegation from the Microcredit Regulatory Authority (MRA), including Director Mr. Md. Zillur Rahman and Deputy Director Md. Minhajul Islam, visited the youth club activities under the adolescent development and cultural program implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar at Chowfaldandi Union, Cox's Bazar Sadar.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Celebrates International Environment Day 2024: Advocating for Land Restoration and Climate Resilience



On June 5, 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar celebrated International Environment Day under the project "DFAT AHP Bangladesh Rohingya Response Phase IV Inclusive." This initiative, implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar with technical support from Oxfam in Bangladesh funded by Australian Aid, aimed to raise awareness about environmental issues, climate smart model village development, livelihood and income generation. The vibrant event took place at Naikyangkhali High School in Hnila Union, Teknaf Upazila.

Activities included competitions, discussion meetings, poetry recitations, and a quiz competition. The theme for International Environment Day 2024 was "Land restoration, desertification and drought resilience." Mr. Syed Lutful Kabir Chowdhury, Deputy Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, emphasized the importance of addressing marine pollution, overpopulation, global warming, sustainable development, and wildlife crime.

World Environment Day serves as a global platform for public outreach. Mukti Cox's Bazar actively promotes awareness, capacity development, and social dialogue through its "Just Transition" approach. As agricultural land in Bangladesh gradually diminishes due to factors like drought, urbanization, and industrial expansion, the need for sustainable practices becomes critical. A study predicts that by 2050, 90% of agricultural land may become unusable due to climate change.

The driving forces behind desertification include modern agricultural practices, adaptation to adverse environments, mineral extraction, deforestation, industrialization, advanced transportation systems, and shifts in land use. Addressing the students, Mr. Chowdhury encouraged them to embody positive qualities and play a vital role in environmental protection.

Shah Alam Noori, President of Naikyongkhali High School, praised the spontaneous participation and eloquent speeches by teachers and students during the event. He commended Mukti Cox's Bazar for their timely efforts in raising awareness about climate change and adaptation. Other notables, including Md. Belal Hossain (UP member) and Rahnuma Akhtar (reserved UP member, Hnila Union Parishad), were also present.

The event witnessed the active engagement of over three hundred students from Naikyongkhali High School, along with teachers and community facilitators from Mukti Cox's Bazar. Since its inception, Menstrual Hygiene Day (MH Day) has experienced remarkable growth and impact. Initiated by the German non-profit organization WASH United in 2013, MH Day has evolved into a global platform dedicated to dismantling taboos and stigma surrounding menstruation. Officially launched in 2014, MH Day aims to raise awareness about the critical importance of proper menstrual hygiene management (MHM) for women and girls worldwide.

Over the past decade, MH Day's influence has expanded significantly, transforming perceptions and practices related to menstruation on a global scale. The campaign has successfully brought together non-profits, governments, the private sector, and millions of individuals in a collective effort to promote menstrual hygiene. The annual observance on May 28th serves as a focal point for these endeavors, emphasizing the urgent need for universal access to high-quality menstrual products, education, and period-friendly facilities.

Under the theme "Together for a Period Friendly World" Mukti Cox's Bazar celebrated Menstrual Hygiene Day 2024. A total of 894 participants (339 male and 555 female) actively engaged in the event. The participants were categorized as follows: adolescent girls (514), adolescent boys (291), male caregivers (2), female caregivers (10), teachers (25), government officials (14), and social leaders (38). The celebration aimed to raise awareness and foster positive dialogue around menstrual health and hygiene.



UNFPA Executive Director Visits GBViE Project and Women Friendly Space of Mukti Cox's Bazar

On May 29, 2024, Dr. Natalia Kanem, the Executive Director of UNFPA, visited the Gender-Based Violence in Emergencies (GBViE) project implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar. During her visit, Dr. Kanem toured the Women Friendly Space (WFS) located at Camp-9. The WFS, reconstructed after devastating fire by an awardwinning architect, embodies traditional Rohingya architecture. At the Women Friendly Space, women and their children find a safe heaven. Here, they can relax, engage in conversations, learn about their rights and those of their daughters, access family planning and midwifery services, spend time with peers, and acquire practical skills such as tailoring. Importantly, the space provides essential reproductive health services and contributes to efforts aimed at preventing and responding to gender-based violence.

This Women Friendly Space is one of 56 such spaces supported by UNFPA and its partners across the Rohingya refugee camps in Cox's Bazar. The visit underscores the commitment to creating safe environments and empowering women and girls in crisis situations.



28th Annual General Meeting (AGM) 2023: Celebrating Progress and Future Endeavors



On August 26, 2023, the Annual General Meeting of Mukti Cox's Bazar was held in the conference room of Mukti Bhaban, commencing at 9:00 AM under the facilitation of the honourable Chief Executive, Mr. Bimal Chandra Dey Sarkar. The meeting was presided over by the esteemed President, Mr. Santosh Sharma. Initially, all respected General Committee Members took their seats and introduced themselves. Following the national anthem, the President officially inaugurated the meeting.

The President expressed his excitement over the high attendance and timely commencement of the meeting, acknowledging the significant challenge it posed to organize and execute it effectively. He attributed the success of the meeting to the dedication of numerous staff members and urged everyone to continue working with sincerity. The inauguration session also included the introduction of two new Executive Committee members: Major (Rtd.) Mrs. Kazi Moushumi and Professor Sharmin Siddika Lima. In his welcome and opening remarks, the President highlighted the history of Mukti Cox's Bazar's journey and outlined the organization's future efforts

Presently, the organization employs 3,560 staff members, 77% of whom are female and 90% are residents of Cox's Bazar district. With nearly 2 million beneficiaries, Mukti Cox's Bazar has established itself as a reputable organization in the region. Mr. Babla Paul, the General Secretary, presented the minutes from the last meeting, which were unanimously approved and accepted. He then provided a brief overview of the annual report for the previous year, expressing gratitude to Mr. Bimal Chandra Dey Sarkar, the Chief Executive, for his dynamic leadership and dedication in achieving the organization's targets and goals. Following this, Mr. Bimal Chandra Dey Sarkar presented the audit report and highlighted the organization's progress over the past year.

In the second segment of the meeting, the current Executive Committee (EC) was dissolved, and a new seven-member Executive Committee was formed for the next three years. At the conclusion of the event, Professor Someswar Chakraborty welcomed all members and reiterated the mission of Mukti Cox's Bazar: "To be good and to do good means I shall be honest and keep the organization honest. If I am not good, it is not possible for me to do good work." He urged everyone to work sincerely and honestly to foster the growth of the organization. Finally, he prayed for the organization's continual improvement and officially closed the meeting.

Project Information



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Financial inclusion is vital for promoting economic development and ensuring the livelihoods of marginalized communities. To achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of No Poverty (SDG1), and Zero Hunger (SDG2), Mukti Cox's Bazar is dedicated to providing access to financial services for marginalized people in Cox's Bazar, Chattogram, and Bandarban. Mukti Cox's Bazar implements a comprehensive microfinance assistance program aimed at poverty reduction, livelihood security, and enhancing the dignity of the target communities. This program provides small loans to individuals, enabling them to start or expand businesses, thereby improving their economic stability.

Additionally, Mukti Cox's Bazar has been implementing the ENRICH project, supported by PKSF, to uplift the dignity and capacity of poor households. This project focuses on holistic development, including health, education, and income-generating activities, ensuring a comprehensive approach to poverty reduction. Through these economic development initiatives and microfinance programs, Mukti Cox's Bazar is making significant steps towards sustainable development and improving the quality of life for underprivileged communities.

Micro Credit Assistance Program (MCAP)





Goal:

To establish a self-reliant and conscious society through economic empowerment that results in poverty reduction

Target Beneficiaries

The marginalized and underprivileged people of the rural and urban community. Mostly poor women, farmers, and potential entrepreneurs. The program has also included the elderly and persons with disability who can operate IGA.

Objectives:

- To reduce poverty and build a sustainable household economy in Bangladesh
- Develop savings tendency among the poor for future investment and crises
- To create self and wage employment through building individual business competency
- Ensure the access of poor women and adolescents to institutional credit and stop the pauperization of the poor.
- To increase women's empowerment and their contribution to the household and nation.

Coverage Area:

Mukti Cox's Bazar is promised to expand its working radius through implementing various projects and activities across the country. Within this process at present Mukti Cox's Bazar has spread its operation of Micro Credit Assistance Program in Bandorban. Now Micro credit Assistance Programme Covers Chattogram, Cox's Bazar and Bandorban districts of Bangladesh. At the moment Micro Credit Assistance Programme is operating the micro finance activities through thirty (30) branches. We have inaugurated seven (7) new branches in Hathazari, Noapara, Chandonaish, Kalarpul of Chattogram, Bandorban and Kalarmarchara, Moricha of Cox's Bazar district.

Main Interventions with Clients:



Operational procedure:

The Microcredit and financial inclusion-oriented interventions of Mukti Coxs Bazar are implemented on the basis of the Savings and Credit Service to clients.

The mode of operation is started by organizing a Samity (Group), either in a rural or urban setting, with the active participation of the beneficiaries. Afterward, a management committee for the Samiti is formed to improve Samity governance. The Samity members choose among themselves the committee members democratically. From the samiti, the member receives credit and savings options.

Product and Service under Micro Credit Assistance Program:



Rural Micro Credit (RMC) and Urban Micro Credit (UMC)-JAGORON

MCB has been implementing Rural Micro Credit (RMC) and Urban Micro Credit (UMC) through 30 branches with the major Savings and Credit Services of the organization. The service charge of the both UMC and RMC is 24% reducing the balance rate according to the MRA rule. The range of credit amount of two of the components is between Tk. 10,000 to 100,000 BDT.

As on 30 June 2024, the total number of clients of RMC and UMC was 19062 where Male-625 and Female 18437. Loanee members were Male-425 and Female-13791 in total-14216. Their savings balance amount was BDT 161,532,571, the Total Loan disbursement of the reporting year was BDT 683340000 and the total outstanding loan was BDT 622940032.







<u>Ultra Poor (UP)—BUNIAD Program</u>

Targeting extremely vulnerable people, MCB started the Savings and Credit Service named BUNIAD (Ultra poor) program. This program is for people who are generally not targeted by the common microcredit products as they are extremely poor. The clients, having no fixed assets are eligible for the Savings and Credit Services. They can get a small amount of credit facility which is up to BDT 30,000. At the end of June 2024, there had been 1352 clients where there were 14 male clients and 1338 female clients. The savings balance was BDT 9334708 and Loan disbursement in the reporting period was BDT 33979000 and the outstanding amount was BDT 15668069.

<u>Agricultural and Seasonal Micro Credit (AMC) Program—SUFOLON</u>

Aiming to support agricultural and farm activities to ensure the improvement of the livelihood of the poor households in rural areas, MCB initiated the agriculture-based micro-credit program—SUFOLON with support from PKSF. The Credit Service is absolutely designed to increase the farm activities that will enhance the livelihood of poor rural households as the agricultural loan support of the program enhances the food security of the poor households in rural areas. The loan ceiling amount is BDT 5,000 to BDT 50,000 and is repayable as per the production and installment schedule of the policy with the interest of 2% monthly in the declining method. This loan is receiving the current member of another program. As on June 2024, there had been 692 borrowers (Male-17, Female-675) with BDT 28405000 outstanding in this program.



Micro Enterprise (ME) Program—AGRASOR



To address the various financial needs of entrepreneurs, MCB has initiated the Micro Enterprise (ME) Program. Usually, poor business owners lack the ability to meet the requirements of formal banks or financial institutions to get loans. MCB MF offer loans for them but, unfortunately, the amount is too low to meet the requirement of the business owners. MCB ME program has been a great support to overcome the shortcomings. MCB ME allows any amount of investment within BDT 100001 to 15 lacks. ME members generally graduated from MCB RMC and UMC and some are lateral. Till the June 2024, there were 756 male and 1836 female members in total 2592 members with BDT 64492749 savings balance and BDT 264227414 loan disbursement in the reporting year. The service charge of the product is calculated in 24% balance-reducing rate. The total outstanding of this scheme was BDT 163588564.

ENRICH Loan:

Characteristically, the credit facility of ENRICH loans is like Rural Micro Credit (RMC) (Jagoron) and the Micro Enterprise (ME) (Agrosor) programs. The added facility is that the clients of ENRICH Program may have loans to grab the opportunity to develop assets. The clients have also access to loans for improving livelihood-related factors like health services, education, and so on. As on June 2024, the client number was 977 (Male-16, Female-961), the loan disbursed among the clients was BDT 51400000 and Loan outstanding amount was BDT 28087314 whereas the saving balance was BDT 13175799.




Member Welfare Fund



The microfinance program of MCB has hosted a benefits package named Member Welfare Fund for microcredit clients. The program was started as one of the vital supports for crisis management and the economic development of vulnerable entrepreneurs. As per the benefit of this facility, in case of the death of any client, his or her spouse, or IGA owner, the outstanding balance of the dead client/IGA owner will be absolved and the savings balance will refund to his/her nominee. Till the June 2024, MCB paid BDT 10274950 among 84 claiming Borrowers as claim from MCB welfare fund to the nominees of the deceased.









Dildar Begam

is now self-reliant

Dildar Begam (52) is the daughter of late Md. Soltan Ahmed and Amina Khatun. Her husband and she, mother of 3 daughters and 4 sons lives at the Bhootpara village under Fotekharkul union in Ramu. Dildar's family of 9 persons was dependent on her husband. Bearing the educational expenses of their 8 children by working as a labor was almost impossible for him which increased unhappiness due to internal fights and troubles. The Chad somitee of the NGO Mukti Cox's Bazar branch was just beside of Dildar's home. One dav. she

went there and talked to the somitee's loan employee about her situation. In 2016, she was given a loan of 20000 taka for vegetable farming after she was done with all the terms and conditions. Dildar started cultivating different vegetables on her house yard beside her working husband. An opportunity was created to repay the loan in installments with the profits, allowing her to simultaneously meet her family's nutritional needs. Thus, it seemed easier for her to cover the educational expenses of her children from her husband's income. Dildars paid all the debts in time and again took a loan of 50000 taka.



With the big sum of investment, Dildar was no longer strict at homestead farming. She started to cultivate many types of vegetables on the fields. This time besides paying the installments she helped her husband bearing the family expense. After figuring out the advantage of vegetable farming and big income from low investment, her husband left his job and started farming with his wife by taking BDT 100,000 loan again from Mukti Cox's Bazar. That's how Dildar Begam's vegetable production started growing, she paid the loan from the profit earned from the sold vegetables and an opportunity to secure a certain savings as well. Currently, Dildar Begam is cultivating on 4 Acores land taken from a loan at the amount of 230,000 taka from Mukti Cox's Bazar Ramu Branch on 10 June, 2024. The harvest goods include Sugarcane, Rice, and Taro. She married off her 3 daughters and sent 2 of her sons abroad. Dilder Begum's family is a solvent and selfreliance family now.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Organized

Special EYE Campaign

A special eye treatment camp was organized at ENRICH project office at Chowfaldandi union of Cox's Bazar Sadar on 20st February, 2024 under ENRICH programme which jointly funded by PKSF and Mukti Cox's Bazar. Mr. Bimal Chandra Dey Sarker, the Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, Mr. Mujibur Rahman, Chairman of Chowfaldandi Union Parishad, Md. Nashir Uddin, Member of UP were present in the opening session. In the opening session Mr. Bimal Chandra Dey Sarker said that eliminating poverty and ensuring dignity in the society by fulfilling the basic needs of people had been always the main focus of Mukti Cox's Bazar since the devastating cyclone in 1991. The Chairman of Chawfaldandi Union highlighted that Mukti Cox's Bazar with the joint efforts with PKSF had been implementing multi-dimensional development activities through ENRICH programme in Chowfaldandi union. From the beginning of this program, hundreds of eye patients got treatment opportunity from this eye camp and poor patient cataract removed by free surgery. In addition to the Government's development, Mukti Cox's Bazar is playing a leading role in the development of this area for which he expressed his gratitude and hoped for the continuous wholehearted cooperation by local authority. In his speech highlighted the diverse development activities conducted by Mukti Cox's Bazar saying that eye camps are organized annually to treat poor patients. He also mentioned that 183 people have undergone cataract surgery and 30 people were about to be operated on that day. He expressed sincere thanks to Cox's Bazar Baitush Sharaf Hospital authorities for the cooperation in organizing the eye camp. Ophthalmology specialists Dr. Md. Ilias Hossain assisted with Field officer of Baytush Sharaf Eye Hospital were provided eye treatment services in the day-long eye camp. A total 269 (male- 58 and female-211) patients were received free eye treatment in this camp. 30 out of 260 patients were selected for cataract surgery and the surgeries were ongoing. Every patient were provided medicines with free of cost. Also all the officials of the programme provided full support for organizing this camp.

Unable to do heavy work, Lal Mia took a loan from Mukti Cox's Bazar and started buying and selling dried fish, earning Tk 350-400 daily. As he aged, he developed eye problems but couldn't afford treatment, further reducing his income. Fortunately, as a health card holder under the ENRICH program, he received regular free medical services. In 2023-2024, a special eye camp diagnosed him with cataracts, and with support from PKSF and Mukti Cox's Bazar, he underwent free cataract surgery. Now, with restored vision, Lal Mia continues to sell dried fish, managing his family's expenses and living happily. He expressed deep gratitude to Mukti Cox's Bazar for transforming his life.

Cultural and Sports Program for Adolescent

The Cultural and Sports Program is the most significant intervention of the Adolescent development program. The major aim of this Program is to support the development of mental and physical state of the young people in order to build a vibrant society. The program has an objective to build awareness among young and adolescents to fight terrorism, sexual harassment, drug, and violence against women etc. Different cultural activities are implemented under the cultural program such as drawing, hand writing, wall magazine, recitation story-telling, folk songs, local songs, acting, and country songs to uphold the traditional and local culture. Besides, under this intervention, different awareness campaigns are being carried out to raise awareness of common mass against dishonesty, corruptions, child marriage, drugs addiction and sexual harassment etc. On the other hand, with a view to ensuring good health and pure entertainment, different sports are organized under the program. The sports organized including football, swimming, mini marathon and cycling etc. On 15 March 2024, a Football Match was organized at Chawfaldandi Union. In the event Professor Mr. Esharul Haque, President of Chawfalandi Football Academy, Md. Shahin Rasel, General Secretary, Md Rana, Baharchhora Nobojagoron Club, Md. Ziaul Hoque Rana, General Secretary of Football Academy Cox's Bazar was present and distributed prizes to the winners and players. In addition, the project organized folksong and local song competition, Art Competitions, Mini marathon, etc. on several dates. This Cultural and Sports Program' for children and young people is organized with the financial support of Palli-Karma Shayahak Foundation (PKSF) and Mukti Cox's Bazar.

The program aims to enhance human development and ensure social dignity through capacity building. The project targets individuals who are stationary and adheres to all project rules and regulations. On June 30, 2024, the project provided wheelchairs to four Persons with Disabilities (2 males and 2 females). A distribution ceremony was held, attended by Mr. Syed Lutful Kabir Chowdhury, Deputy Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, as the chief guest, and Mr. Nitai Chandra Sen, Coordinator-Government and Donor Liaison, as the special guest. Other notable attendees included Md. Ruhul Amin, Project Coordinator, and Mr. Sagar Sharma, Branch Manager of MCAP. The event was facilitated by Mr. Shofiul Alam, Program Officer of the project.

The recipients expressed their deep satisfaction and gratitude to Mukti Cox's Bazar for the wheelchairs, acknowledging the significant impact on their mobility and quality of life.



Education Sector

(Quality Education for All)

The Mukti Cox's Bazar Education program recognizes the transformative power of education in improving the lives of thousands of underprivileged children. By aligning with Sustainable Development Goal 4, which aims to "ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all," the program significantly enhances the overall development of both Bangladeshi nationals and the children of the Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMN). Mukti Cox's Bazar collaborates with the government and other stakeholders to achieve this objective.

Since the Rohingya influx in August 2017, Mukti Cox's Bazar, with support from UNICEF and international partners, has been at the forefront of educational initiatives in both the FDMN camps and the host community in Cox's Bazar, Chattogram and Noakhali district. The UNICEF-funded FDMN project has significantly intensified efforts to provide quality education to Rohingya children and adolescents aged 11 to 17. This project has successfully implemented the Myanmar curriculum for FDMN children, ensuring they receive a structured and relevant education. Mukti Cox's Bazar is implementing an Early Childhood Development (ECD) program in the FDMN camps with the support of UNICEF. Additionally, using its own funds, Mukti is operating ECD schools in Ramu and Cox's Bazar Sadar. This initiative focuses on providing young Rohingya children and host community children with a strong foundation during their formative years. The ECD program aims to enhance cognitive, emotional, and social development through structured activities and learning environments

In addition to these initiatives, Mukti Cox's Bazar is at the forefront of developing and utilizing digital learning content through its Non-Formal Education Program for the Children of the Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMN) and the host communities in Cox's Bazar, Chattogram, and Bhasanchor funded by Children on the Edge (COTE). This initiative aims to enhance the educational experience of the underprivileged children and delivery of the learning sessions. Furthermore, Mukti Cox's Bazar distinguishes itself as the sole organization piloting the use of the HANIFI script in the FDMN camps, also supported by COTE. This initiative aims to facilitate the Myanmar curriculum by providing supplementary language support, thereby enriching the educational experience for Rohingya children.

Through these comprehensive and innovative efforts, Mukti Cox's Bazar is making a substantial impact on the educational landscape, fostering a brighter future for both the Rohingya and local communities.



- 9) Facilitate ECD, primary, and secondary education programs for Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMN) children.
- Ensure inclusive session facilitation to accommodate children with disabilities.
- 11) Conduct parenting courses for parents and primary caregivers of ECD learners
- Organize teacher learning sessions.
- 13) Distribute learning materials to learners including books, pencil, pen etc.
- 14) Facilitate parents' meetings.
- 15) Conduct home visits to minimize dropout rates and absenteeism.
- 16) Oversee all logistical arrangements to ensure the smooth operation of the program.
- 17) Distribute incentives to volunteers serving as cleaners and guards.
- 18) Regularly monitor learning centers and lesson plans.



The Year-End Assessment and Placement Test for the academic year 2023-24 were conducted by Mukti Cox's Bazar FDMN Education Project from June 2 to June 11, 2024, across seven Rohingya camps. The Year-End Assessment covered learners from Grade 3 to Grade 10. Out of 13,284 enrolled learners (5,464 girls and 7,820 boys), 13,268 attended (5,458 girls and 7,810 boys).

For Grade 3, 7,081 learners (3,473 girls and 3,608 boys) attended out of 7,092 enrolled (3,479 girls and 3,613 boys). In Grade 4, all 2,663 enrolled learners (1,188 girls and 1,475 boys) attended. Grade 5 saw 260 attendees (77 girls and 183 boys) out of 260 enrolled. In Grade 6, 1,651 learners (516 girls and 1,135 boys) attended out of 1,653 enrolled (516 girls and 1,137 boys). For Grade 7, 1,067 learners (189 girls and 878 boys) attended out of 1,069 enrolled (189 girls and 880 boys). In Grade 8, 404 learners (13 girls and 391 boys) attended out of 404 enrolled. Grade 9 had 133 attendees (2 girls and 131 boys) out of 134 enrolled (2 girls and 132 boys). All 9 enrolled boys in Grade 10 attended.

Among 149 Children with Disabilities (CwD) (57 girls and 92 boys), 100% attended the Year-End Assessment. Additionally, 2,074 out-of-school children (OOSC) (1,237 girls and 837 boys) participated in the placement test to determine their appropriate grade levels. Specifically, 1,706 children (1,140 girls and 566 boys) were tested for Grades 2-4, 190 children (71 girls and 119 boys) for Grades 4-6, 161 children (26 girls and 135 boys) for Grades 6-8, and 17 boys for Grades 8-10. The Year-End Assessment was held on June 2, 3, 10, and 11, 2024, while the Placement Test took place on June 6, 2024. The Cox's Bazar Education sector prepared and provided the question sets for both assessments. Officials from the Education sector, UNICEF, and Mukti Cox's Bazar monitored the assessments, with visits from the Camp-in-Charge and Assistant Camp-in-Charge to the test centers.



Learners from Mukti Cox's Bazar's Learning Center (LC) achieved remarkable success by winning 1st prize in a cultural competition. The event, organized by the CiC office of Camp-13 on December 19, 2023, saw Md. Junaid winning 1st prize in the costume contest (Religious Leader), Jesma securing 1st prize in the Burmese Anthem category, and Md. Munaif earning 3rd prize in the costume contest (Doctor). Participants from various Child Learning Centers and education partners took part in the competition. The Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commissioner, Mizanur Rahman, attended as the chief guest and presented the awards to the winners. Other notable attendees included Camp-In-Charge Parimol Kumar Sarkar, PS to RRRC Arif Faysal Khan, APBN officials, representatives from different implementing partners, and community leaders.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Expands Educational Reach with New Learning Facilities

Mukti Cox's Bazar has taken over 284 Learning Facilities from various implementing partners across 7 FDMN Camps, starting from January 1, 2024.

These facilities include 128 Learning Centers (LC) and 156 Community Based Learning Facilities (CBLF). This transition is part of the Education sector's rationalization process, led by UNICEF and UNHCR, which reallocated Learning Facilities among their implementing partners. Before this rationalization, Mukti Cox's Bazar managed 536 Learning Centers in 10 FDMN Camps.

Following the reallocation, Mukti Cox's Bazar handed over 82 Learning Centers in 3 Camps: 15 LCs in Camp-04, 1 LC in Camp-11, and 66 LCs in Camp-13. Concurrently, they took over 284 Learning Facilities in 7 Camps, including 36 LCs and 49 CBLFs in Camp-1E, 12 LCs and 44 CBLFs in Camp-1W, 11 LCs and 17 CBLFs in Camp-2E, 7 LCs and 16 CBLFs in Camp-2W, 32 LCs and 30 CBLFs in Camp-03, 14 LCs in Camp-09, and 16 LCs in Camp-17. This strategic move aims to optimize the distribution and management of educational resources within the camps.

- 10) Administer formal yearly examinations and publish results.
- 11) Organize training on Prevention of Sexual Exploitation, Abuse, and Harassment (PSEAH) and safeguarding for all staff.
- 12) Provide capacity-building training for teachers and staff.
- 13) Organize annual sports events and picnics for the students.



On December 9, 2023, Mukti Cox's Bazar successfully held its annual sports competition, discussion meeting, and prize distribution program at the Sangu Convention in Dohazari, Chandanaish. This event, which supports 500 underprivileged, poor, and dropout/working children, saw participation from students, teachers, and officials of five Mukti schools in Chandanaish and Satkania Upazila of Chattogram district. The event was made possible with financial support from the Children on the Edge, along with the involvement of Mukti Cox's Bazar employees and officials. During the event, children enthusiastically participated in various sports competitions in the morning, celebrating their wins.

Sudeb Rudra, the Project Manager of the Supplemental Education Program-Chattogram, presided over the day-long discussion meeting. The chief guest was Advocate Shibu Lal Devdas, an advisor to Mukti Cox's Bazar and a prominent lawyer. Professor Ajit Das, an Executive Committee member of Mukti Cox's Bazar, attended as the special guest. Representing the students, Sifat Sultana from Syed Ahmed Para Mukti School and Md. Aziz from West Katgar Mukti School shared their experiences. Accounts Officer Alok Kanti Sharma and retired teacher Jagdish Sharma, a parent member, also addressed the gathering. The speakers expressed their appreciation for the smooth completion of the annual sports competition. The event concluded with the distribution of prizes to the winners. The day was filled with a festive atmosphere, featuring singing and dancing, and breakfast and lunch were provided for everyone present.

From Hardship to Hope at Mukti School

Zainal Abedin is a fifth-grade student at Syed Ahmed Para Mukti School in Dohazari, Chandanaish. His father left the family many years ago, and they have had no contact since. Zainal's mother works as a day labourer to support her three sons. Zainal is the youngest, with an elder brother who is disabled and a younger brother who also attends Syed Ahmed Para Mukti School. The family lives near the school.

Zainal shared, "I love studying here since I was a child. I always asked my mother to enrol me in the school, but due to our poverty, she couldn't afford the costs of notebooks, pens, school uniforms, and examination fees, even though government schools are free. This made my mother very sad. However, when Mukti School was established by Mukti Cox's Bazar in our area, my mother's face lit up with joy. My dream came true as my brother and I were able to enrol in school. The school assured us that we could complete our primary education without any cost over five years. When everyone learned that the



education would be free, the entire community was thrilled. Many children like me joined the school, and I am very happy to study with everyone in the area."

Zainal continued, "Now I am in class five and attend school every day. I've learned a lot, including reading Bengali and English well and solving complex mathematical problems. I've also learned many songs and various sports. A few months ago, I even won a prize in the annual sports competition. Our school now has daily video lessons, allowing us to watch educational videos from different schools in Cox's Bazar and learn a lot. I enjoy learning through videos and want to participate in various educational activities shown in them. Besides studying, I work in a tea shop from noon to evening after attending school in the morning. I help my family by giving my earnings to my mother. This doesn't interfere with my studies as I complete my lessons each day."

Reflecting on his education, Zainal said, "Everything I've learned from this school. My education began here, and it has been invaluable for me." Zainal's mother added, "Both my son's study at Syed Ahmed Para Mukti School. Without Mukti School, they wouldn't have learned so much. I am very happy to see their progress. I am grateful to Mukti Cox's Bazar and Children on the Edge."

Fatema Khatun's Inspiring Educational Journey

Fatema was born into a loving family in Rakhine, where her parents, Hashim and Nachima, created a life filled with warmth and happiness. However, their tranquillity contrasted sharply with the plight of the Rohingya community, which faced systemic discrimination and brutality from the Myanmar government. As tensions escalated, the Rohingya became targets of government oppression, with accusations of terrorism leading to widespread violence and displacement. Fatema's family experienced this firsthand when her father, Hashim, was unjustly apprehended and murdered by military forces. Faced with imminent danger, Fatema and her mother fled their home.

Upon arriving in Bangladesh, Fatema's family found shelter and support in the Kutupalong camp, thanks to the compassion of local residents and humanitarian organizations. Within the chaos and uncertainty, education offered Fatema a shine of hope and stability. In 2018, at the age of seven, Fatema gained access to a learning center funded by Children on the Edge near their shelter. This initiative provided her with the opportunity to pursue education despite the challenges of displacement. With determination enthusiasm. Fatema excelled in subjects like painting, crafting, and health education. Through her dedication and the support of organizations like Children on the Edge and Mukti Cox's Bazar, Fatema thrived academically, passing her exams in 2022 and progressing to a higher grade.

The transformative power of education not only restored a sense of routine to Fatema's life but also equipped her with essential skills in Burmese and English, empowering her to navigate future challenges with resilience and confidence. Fatema's story serves as a poignant reminder of the indomitable human spirit in the face of adversity.

Tanjina Moni's Journey

from Najirartek to Academic Excellence

at Mukti School

Tanjina Moni, a 14-year-old girl from Najirartek in Cox's Bazar, faced significant challenges in pursuing her education due to financial constraints and an accident that fractured her right hand. Initially enrolled in a remote Madrasha, she missed two years of school and couldn't afford treatment or re-enrollment. However, she discovered Mukti School, established by Mukti Cox's Bazar, which offers free education. Enrolled in 2020, Tanjina found Mukti School's quality of education and facilities far superior. The school uses digital video content for teaching and offers various co-curricular activities, including sports and arts. Tanjina enjoys playday every Thursday and has won several prizes in drawing and sports competitions. She has also participated in the MojaKids digital newsletter multiple times. Tanjina's mother, Manwara Begum, supports her education and encourages her participation in all activities. Tanjina, now a class five student and child council representative, suggested planting and caring for trees to improve the environment. Her idea was well-received by teachers and project officials. Tanjina aspires to be a doctor and credits Mukti School for providing her with the opportunity to pursue her dreams. Her mother is grateful for the school's support in educating her children.

Tanjina's mother, who works in the dry fish production sector in Najirar Tek, is determined to ensure her children continue their studies. Tanjina occasionally helps her mother at work. Despite this, her mother sometimes needs her assistance, especially when she's unwell. Tanjina helps her mother calculate her wages and has taught her how to sign her name. She also regularly assists her younger brother with his studies. Tanjina's speaking accent has improved significantly, and she is excelling in her education.



MOJAKIDS (Newsletter) and Digital lessons



Establishing an integrated education system for Rohingya students is crucial for several reasons. Education empowers individuals and communities by providing knowledge and skills lead to better livelihoods that opportunities. For the Rohingya, who have displacement and marginalization, access to education is vital for their long-term well-being and integration into society.

The current education system has struggled to deliver effective education to Rohingya students, primarily due to linguistic barriers with the national curriculum of Myanmar. To address this, CHILDREN ON THE EDGE has introduced a digital education method, converting Burmese subjects into lesson-based video lessons.

In 2023, the Digital lesson development department created 466 digital lessons across

Mojakids is a weekly newsletter designed for students to share their ideas, stories, and talents, fostering a global community. The platform currently highlights the stories of underprivileged children in Bangladesh, India, Cambodia. Myanmar, and Uganda, with a special focus on Rohingya children living in camps.

We aim to encourage communication among children worldwide under the Children on the Edge education project. Through Mojakids, children exchange their talents beyond the curriculum, such as crafts, music, dance, and sports. Seeing their own and their international friends' contributions brings them immense joy and motivates them to achieve more. We prioritize respecting their privacy and addressing their parents' concerns.

GENDER AND PROTECTION

In line with Sustainable Development Goal-5, "Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls" Mukti Cox's Bazar addresses Gender-Based Violence in Emergencies (GBViE) and protection concerns to save lives, protect dignity, and advance gender equality, women's and girls' empowerment, Sexual and reproductive health and rights, especially for the most vulnerable and marginalized women, adolescents, and youth. At Mukti Cox's Bazar, we are dedicated to designing and implementing activities that prioritize equality and women's empowerment. Our initiatives specifically address the physical and mental impacts of gender-based violence (GBV) and sexual exploitation, abuse, and harassment (SEAH). We provide comprehensive psychosocial support and aid to survivors of GBV and SEAH, ensuring they receive the care and assistance they need. Additionally, we advocate for the rights of all women and girls to live in a family and society free from violence and abuse. These programs align with the organization's mission and are supported by its gender, safeguarding and PSEA policy.

Mukti Cox's Bazar is actively working to mitigate protection risks in both host communities and FDMN camps. The efforts include raising awareness through comprehensive training for women and girls on topics such as gender equality, human rights, early marriage, domestic violence, and protection from sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA) as well as providing practical solutions to enhance safety and security. One of the key initiatives is the distribution of solar lights to households and repairing the solar street lights. These solar lights not only improve visibility and safety at night but also contribute to a sense of security among the women and girls. By addressing both immediate protection needs and long-term investment to enhance the transformative leadership capacity of the women, Mukti Cox's Bazar is making a significant impact on the safety and well-being of the communities.

Struggle to Strength:

Saleha Begum's Journey with Mukti Cox's Bazar

Saleha Begum is a 30-year-old Rohingya refugee living in Camp-16 with her husband, five children (two boys and three girls), and her in-laws. Her husband, who is a businessman, spends money on other women and does not support the family. Saleha struggles to manage with the rations she receives from the camp.

Saleha learned about Mukti's Women Friendly Space (WFS) when volunteers visited her area. She collects the information of the services offered in the WFS and decided to visit. She enjoyed talking to the caseworkers and started attending various sessions, including those on gender-based violence (GBV) awareness, psychosocial support (PSS), and social support sessions (SS).

Saleha expressed her need for financial support to

a caseworker, who then helped her join skills training activities where she learned sewing and handicrafts. She practiced regularly at the WFS and eventually joined livelihood projects with other service providers. Now, she earns money using the skills she learned, which helps her support her family.

The caseworker also worked with the community watch group to talk to Saleha's husband. Through awareness sessions, they managed to convince him to support his family. Saleha said that her husband now shows positive support to the family instead of philandering. So, she is very grateful to Mukti Cox's Bazar and UNFPA. She believes every woman and adolescent should visit WFS and she plans to encourage others women and adolescent to come to the WFS.

Celebration of World Mental Health Day 2024

On March 7, 2024, World Mental Health Day was observed across all Women Friendly Spaces (WFS) in Ukhiya and Teknaf. The theme for World Mental Health Day, "It's Time to Prioritize Mental Health in the Workplace," emphasized the importance of addressing mental health and well-being in the workplace for the benefit of individuals, organizations, and communities.

The celebration aimed to raise awareness about mental health issues and promote mental well-being. It provided a platform for service providers and agencies working on mental health to discuss their contributions and identify further needs to enhance mental health care among Rohingya and adjacent host communities. The UNFPA-MHPSS team implemented eight activities, including drama, cultural events, finding soothers, skill exploration, and canvas art, all aligned with the theme and covering both host and refugee communities. Many project participants, including persons with disabilities and other stakeholders, took part in the program. The event was specifically designed for the Rohingya Refugee Camp, focusing on Rohingya women and adolescent girls who have endured severe misogyny by the Myanmar Army. World Mental Health Day also served as an opportunity to discuss mental health in general, emphasizing the importance of self-care and seeking help when needed.



Uniting for Change

16 Days of Activism

Against Gender-Based Violence 2024

The 16 Days of Activism, observed from the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women on November 25 to Human Rights Day on December 10, is an annual campaign against gender-based violence. This campaign calls for action against one of the world's most persistent human rights violations: violence against women. During the 16 Days of Activism, people around the world unite to raise awareness about gender-based violence, challenge discriminatory attitudes, and advocate for improved laws and justice to end violence against women for good.

The 16 Days of Activism is a time when a united, bold voice speaks out with one agenda: "End violence against women and girls." People from all walks of life come together to raise awareness about gender-based violence in streets, schools, workplaces, villages, and cities. This year, the UNiTE Campaign's global theme for the 16 Days of Activism is "Invest to Prevent Violence Against Women and Girls." Mukti Cox's Bazar observed the day from March 7 to 14, under the UNFPA-supported GBViE project, across various Women Friendly Spaces (WFS) in Ukhiya and Teknaf. The event included diverse activities such as mindfulness sessions. community awareness programs on human trafficking, round table discussions, cultural and gaming activities, art reflections, and informationsharing sessions on preventing violence against women and girls. Participants from different backgrounds actively engaged in these activities, sharing their experiences and recommendations for reducing violence and ensuring equal rights.

One participant, 25-year-old Dil Ankis, shared her experience saying that "Through this program, I discovered a day dedicated to celebrating women's contributions worldwide. During the event, I sewed a nakshi katha that realize me I had forgotten about my many talents, but this program reminded me of my skills. Now, I understand I need to practice and express my abilities to regain my self-respect and prove that I am capable."

- Increased the knowledge of women and men on gender issues, gender-based violence (GBV), and human rights.

Celebrating International Girl Child Day 2023 at Whykong Union

Mukti Cox's Bazar Celebrated the International Girl Child Day 2023 at the Multipurpose Women Center in Whykong Union, Teknaf Upazila, on October 11, 2023. The event was organized as part of the project activity including participants from Kanjor Para High School. The objectives of the event were to focus attention on the challenges girls face, increase girls' self-acceptance, promote girls' empowerment and the fulfilment of their human rights, ensure girls' personal growth, and enhance positive relationships with others.

The opening session included a debate competition, an art competition, and a prize distribution ceremony. The project staff managed the debate competition, with three school teachers acting as judges. Mr. Rafiqul Alam, the head teacher of Kanjor Para High School, moderated the debate. After informative, valid and extensive arguments, the opposing team emerged as champion. The topic of the debate competition was "Not only the rule of law but also public awareness can ensure the rights of the girl child." The audience enjoyed the debaters' presentations, and Shawrin Samjida Emu was chosen as the best debater.

In the art competition, participants depicted various natural scenes and themes related to Girl Child Day. The respected Chairperson of the Union Parishad, Mr. Nur Ahmad Anowari, presided over the program. He stressed the importance of nurturing children for a better future and supporting the country's progress. He thanked Mukti Cox's Bazar for organizing such an important event and selected the best art competitor from sixteen participants. The program concluded with the Chairperson of the Union Parishad and the head teacher of Kanjor Para High School distributing prizes and announcing the end of the event.

Rabeya Begum Transforms Her Life

Through Leadership and Skill Development Training in Cox's Bazar

Rabeya Begum, the wife of Mohammed Ali, is one of the many underprivileged women living in Kanjorpara village, Whykong Union, Teknaf Upazila, in Cox's Bazar district. Her family relied entirely on her husband's insufficient income. Unfortunately, within a few years, her husband, Md Ali, became addicted to drugs and frequently abused her for money to buy drugs. Rabeya lodged a complaint to Union Parishad against her husband for a proper judgment. Her husband refugeds the judgment of Union Parishad and beat her a lot. Due to her lack of mental and financial capacity, she was unable to take legal action. Moreover, Rabeya's husband abandoned her and their four children, leaving her in a dire situation.

To support her family, Rabeya started working as a low-paid day laborer in the surrounding area, but the work was irregular, and she struggled to meet their basic needs. In early 2022, her brother gave her a used sewing machine, and she learned sewing from a neighbor. In July 2023, Rabeya joined the project as one of the beneficiaries and received livelihood support as a vulnerable female-headed household in the small business category. She gained knowledge from learning sessions, leadership training, and participated in tailoring training. She successfully completed skills development training in business management and business planning. With the project's support, she decided to set up a tailoring shop at her home. In September 2023, Rabeya received a cash grant of BDT 10,000 from the project and established a well-organized tailoring shop in her house. This experience boosted her self-confidence and determination to thrive with dignity in society. She began helping other women and girls facing similar challenges.

Rabeya's hard work paid off, and her business started generating a steady income. She now earns an average of BDT 15,500 per month. Her two sons and one daughter are regularly attending school, and her daughter has also learned sewing from her. She even bought another used sewing machine, and her daughter helps in the tailoring shop. Rabeya dreams of educating her four children and transforming her life positively. Rabeya expressed her gratitude, saying, "Mukti Cox's Bazar contributed a lot to turn my life around and bring remarkable change. I thank Mukti Cox's Bazar, OXFAM, and UN Women for their support."

Market Actor Visit and Exchange Meeting by Production Centre

On October 1, 2020, Mukti Cox's Bazar began implementing the project titled "Empowering Rohingya Refugee and Host Community Women through Leadership, Learning, and Livelihoods," supported by OXFAM and funded by UN Women. This project operates in Whykong Union, Teknaf, Holdyapalong, Ukhiya, and Cox's Bazar Sadar. As part of this project, Mukti Cox's Bazar organized a "Market Actor Visit and Exchange Meeting with Production Centre" at Whykong, Teknaf, to promote production and market linkage. This event aimed to create opportunities for project participants through a visit and exchange meeting at the production center in MPWC, Kanjorpara, Whykong, Teknaf. The visit and exchange meeting took place on December 20, 2023.

The objectives of the event were to introduce project participants to various stakeholders for market linkages and financial inclusion, promote opportunities for women to receive support from different stakeholders, ensure quality inputs and fair pricing for outputs, enhance business growth, income, and sustainability of income-generating activities (IGAs), and develop the business management capacity of project participants.

A total of 20 market actors attended the visit and exchange meeting at the production center. They highly praised Mukti Cox's Bazar for organizing such a remarkable event.



Delivering life skills education and improving menstrual health of adolescent girls and women in Cox's Bazar and Basan char, Bangladesh

- 6) Conduct sessions with male caregivers using the MHM-focused male caregiver curriculum.
- 7) Offer self-reliance education sessions on origami, crochet, and sewing.
- 8) Celebrate awareness days such as Youth Day, International Girl Child Day, 16 Days of Activism, and Menstrual Hygiene Day, led by youth.
- 9) Conduct outreach sessions with adolescent girls to raise awareness.
- 10) Construct or renovate adolescent and youth centers in the camps.
- 11) Organize sports competitions such as badminton tournaments, chess games, volleyball matches, and Shallum competitions, engaging adolescent girls and boys to support their resilience.
- 12) Produce sanitary pads with the involvement of adolescent girls and female caregivers.



Girls Shine Session with Adolescent Girls

From July 2023 to June 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar conducted MHM-focused Girl Shine Sessions, a vital initiative aimed at empowering adolescent girls and promoting menstrual hygiene management (MHM) in Cox's Bazar and Bhasanchar. These sessions focused on creating a supportive and empowering environment, providing comprehensive education to dispel myths and offer accurate information about menstruation. By emphasizing proper hygiene practices and the use of sanitary products, the sessions aimed to nurture the physical, mental, and emotional well-being of adolescent girls.

Implemented across eight camps and eight host/local communities, these sessions played a crucial role in breaking societal stigmas surrounding menstruation through open communication and community engagement. The overarching objective was to provide comprehensive support, protection, and empowerment to girls in humanitarian settings through the IMHM Project. By engaging communities, schools, and professionals, these sessions advocated for environmentally and economically sustainable practices, aiming for a lasting impact on girls' overall health, education, and empowerment.

During this reporting period, Mukti Cox's Bazar conducted a total of 1,764 sessions (845 in camps and 919 in host communities) focusing on menstrual health management using the Girl Shine curriculum. A total of 1,547 adolescent girls (1,202 from host communities and 345 from camps) enrolled and benefited from these structured life skills sessions focused on MHM. Out of these, 1,412 girls (1,067 from host communities and 345 from camps) successfully graduated from the program.

These sessions have played a crucial role in equipping adolescent girls with the knowledge and skills to manage their menstrual health effectively, thereby nurturing self-confidence and empowerment.

Mukti Cox's Bazar's IMHM Project

Livelihood Interventions Benefit

Over 2,700 Adolescent Girls

Since 2022, Mukti Cox's Bazar has been implementing the "Improving Menstrual Health Management of Adolescent Girls and Women in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh (IMHM)" project, with support from the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). The project aims to benefit 3,600 adolescent girls by 2024. It is being carried out in eight camps (1W, 11, 12, 13, 15, 19, and 27) in Cox's Bazar, including Bhasanchar, as well as in eight schools in Teknaf, Ukhiya, Moheskhali, and Sadar Upazila. To empower adolescent girls, Mukti Cox's Bazar has implemented a livelihood intervention in schools and camps. From July 2023 to June 2024, this intervention provided valuable skills training in sewing, origami, and crochet to a total of 2,674 adolescent girls. The goal is to equip them with skills that can enhance their economic prospects and contribute to their overall development. By implementing the IMHM project and the livelihood intervention, Mukti Cox's Bazar aims to positively impact the lives of adolescent girls and their female caregivers. These initiatives not only provide practical skills but also empower them to become self-sufficient and independent.



The project's emphasis on economic empowerment aligns with the broader goal of promoting gender equality and women's empowerment. In the reporting period total 2,757 adolescent girls are enrolled in camps and schools. Of these, 1,150 adolescents completed the self-reliance pad-making, crochet, and origami sessions in camps, and 1,607 completed them in host community schools.

MHM Kits distribution

Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) kits are essential for every adolescent girl and woman, playing a crucial role in supporting menstrual health, dignity, education, and empowerment. By addressing the specific needs during menstruation, these kits help break down barriers, promote inclusivity, and contribute to overall well-being. Often, this is the first time recipients receive comprehensive information and guidelines about menstrual products. To enhance menstrual hygiene practices, the IMHM Project has distributed MHM kit bags to graduated adolescent girls after they completed the Girl Shine Curriculum Session. These kits contain items that meet the specific needs of girls and women for reproductive health and hygiene during menstruation.





Each kit includes items such as sanitary pads, underwear, a towel, a torch, sandals, detergent powder, bathing soap, and a UNFPA logo-printed bag. In this reporting period, the project distributed 2,322 MHM kits to participants, including 2,967 in camps and 1,358 in the host community, targeting adolescent girls aged 10-19 years. Yasmin Tara, a 16-year-old adolescent from Camp 19, said, "The MHM kit bag is very useful during and after menstruation, and I will use them as needed." Alamgir Kabir, Head Teacher at Abul Kashem Nurjahan Chowdhury High School, emphasized, "Healthy women lead to healthy mothers, which in turn create healthy nations. This underscores the importance of our efforts in promoting menstrual health and hygiene."

- 8) Organize advocacy meetings with local government and stakeholders to discuss RCA findings.

- 10) Disseminate important awareness messages through folk songs.
- 11) Provide training to CBOs on safe programming, referrals, project management, conflict management, and linking with other stakeholders.
- 12) Facilitate day-long exchange visits and experience-sharing sessions between host and refugee communities to increase social cohesion.
- 13) Engage with community-based structures to adapt programs and develop community action plans, involving protection committees, religious leaders, and women's groups.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Organized a Stage Drama to Combat Human Trafficking



On January 4, 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar, in collaboration with the Danish Refugee Council (DRC) and supported by Oxfam in Bangladesh, organized a 'Stage Drama to Stop Human Trafficking' as part of the 'DFAT AHP Bangladesh Rohingya Response Phase IV Inclusive' project. The event was held at Darbar Hall, in Camp 12 coordinated with the Camp in Charge (CiC). Before the performance, the project's Protection and Gender team briefed participants on the drama's objectives. Rohingya volunteers performed the drama in their native language, effectively raising awareness about human trafficking by highlighting how external influences can lead victims to negative coping mechanisms, increasing their vulnerabilities and potential threats to their lives.

Approximately 150 people, including women, men, and adolescents from the community, attended and gained a deeper understanding of trafficking risks. A feedback session following the performance revealed significant audience appreciation, with many participants feeling motivated by the recognition of their contributions. The drama's realistic representation aimed to have a lasting impact on viewers. Furthermore, the Camp-In-charge and the Assistant Camp in Charge provided clear directives to ensure that future activities remain free from political biases, promoting an inclusive and neutral environment. The event concluded on a high note with an interactive session where the audience voted for the top performers. The selected actors were honored with blankets as tokens of appreciation for their outstanding contributions.

Empowering Youth Through Sports

A Step Towards Gender Equality

On June 25, 2024, a significant event titled "Play and Thrive: Sports Gear Giveaway for Youth Wellbeing" was held at Camp 19 Conference Room. The event was inaugurated by the Camp-in-Charge, who delivered an inspiring opening remark. The primary objective was to encourage young boys and girls to engage in sports as a positive alternative to negative coping mechanisms.



The session aimed to empower young individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to advocate for gender equality. Participants were actively involved in dynamic discussions and collaborative activities that addressed various aspects of gender inequality. These activities provided a platform for the youth to explore and understand the importance of gender equality in their communities.

By the end of the session, participants had gained a solid understanding of gender equality issues and practical methods to address them. They expressed a strong commitment to applying this knowledge to promote gender equality within their communities. The workshop effectively built the participants' skills and confidence, enabling them to become advocates for a more equitable society. The participants left the event feeling motivated and equipped to make a positive impact in their communities.

Mukti Cox's Bazar's Initiative to Reduce Eve-teasing and **Increase security**



in Hnila Union

On December 10, 2023, Mukti Cox's Bazar Protection and Gender Team, in collaboration with Oxfam and funded by the Australian Humanitarian Partnership (AHP), organized the "Empower Her Library Initiative" as part of the 16 Days of Activism against GBV Campaign. The event took place in Hnila Chowdhury Para, Ward-07, with the aim of enriching a women-led community library. A dialogue session was held between local public representatives and project participants.

During the session, Lay May, a 20-year-old participant, voiced her concerns to the public representatives. She highlighted that Chowdhury Para village, home to the Rakhine community, is a quiet, clean, and beautiful place that attracts visitors from various communities. However, Rakhine community girls and women often face comments shameless and eve-teasing. Additionally, the village's gold shops are frequently targeted by robbers, causing significant worry among the locals. In response, the local UP Chairman immediately contacted the responsible BGB officials in front of the attendees and advised them to increase night patrols to address the security issues. The local UP member also announced that Hnila station and nearby areas would be informed about the curfew in Chowdhury Para through public announcements (miking). This proactive approach resulted in meaningful advocacy through the Empower Her Library Initiative program.

Subsequently, when the Mukti Cox's Bazar Protection Team followed up on the situation, they learned that by December 12, 2023, the miking program had been completed and BGB security patrols had been increased. As a result, incidents of eve-teasing were reduced, and the overall security concerns of the locals were effectively addressed.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Distributed Essential Dignity Kits to Over 1,200 Women and Girls



Mukti Cox's Bazar is implementing a project titled 'Centrality of Protection in Protracted Crises,' supported by Care Bangladesh and funded by Australian Aid under the DFAT AHP IV Consortium. As part of this initiative, Mukti Cox's Bazar distributed dignity kits to support women and girls. The distribution events took place in Camps 11, 12, and 16 during November and December 2023, reaching a total of 1,210 women and girls. These kits tailored to the specific needs of women and girls, included essential toiletries

such as laundry bars and buckets, sanitary supplies for menstruation, clean undergarments, and flashlights to ensure safe travel at night. Care Bangladesh and Mukti Cox's Bazar coordinated with the Camp-in-Charge (CiC), Camps distribution center, Site Management, Protection sectors, and various agencies, adhering to protocols established by the Dignity Kits Task Force. The Camp-in-Charge of the respective camps inaugurated the events, expressing gratitude for the distribution of dignity kits and emphasizing the importance of proper monitoring and follow-up to ensure the effective use of the kits, as some were found in the market shortly after distribution. Special provisions included the establishment of Feedback and Complaint Boxes, prioritization of persons with disabilities, lactating mothers, and pregnant women, with porters available to assist. The distribution process was meticulously monitored by representatives from the CiC's office distribution center and the Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning (MEAL) team of Mukti Cox's Bazar. The dignity kits had a profound impact on the recipients by providing basic hygiene and sanitary supplies, enhancing safety and mobility, offering budget flexibility, and serving as entry points for raising awareness about GBV and accessing related services.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Celebrates 16 Days of Activism with Inclusive Participation of Persons with Disabilities

Each year, from November 25 (International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) to December 10 (Human Rights Day), the global community unites to demand a safer world for women and girls by observing the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence. In Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, Mukti Cox's Bazar is actively responding to the protracted Rohingya crisis by advocating for the safety and dignity of women and girls in both the camps and host communities. This year, the project team is celebrating the 16 Days of Activism by organizing a series of special activities aimed at raising awareness and eliminating fear. These activities include awareness workshops on gender-based violence, community dialogues to foster understanding and support, and the distribution of dignity kits to enhance the well-being and safety of women and girls as well as inclusion of person with disabilities in the GBV prevention and response interventions. The team is also engaged with local leaders and organizations to ensure a coordinated and impactful response. By engaging both the Rohingya and host communities, Mukti Cox's Bazar aims to create a vibrant stand against gender-based violence, promoting a culture of respect and protection for all women and girls in the region.



Yasmin's Journey from

Awareness to Advocacy

in Cox's Bazar

Yasmin Bibi, a 14-year-old girl living in a camp for displaced Rohingya in Ukhiya, Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, had to stop her education at 13 due to cultural norms surrounding menstruation. She expected take household responsibilities and faced the prospect of early marriage. However, her life changed when she discovered a Women and Girls Safe Space (WGSS) through her friends. At the WGSS, Yasmin learned about social networks, self-confidence, and life skills to combat Gender-Based Violence (GBV). After an awareness session, she joined the Girls Shine program, an evidence-based curriculum designed to prevent and respond to violence against adolescent girls in humanitarian settings. The program covers six core topics: trust, social and emotional skills, health and hygiene, safety, solidarity, and visioning, with





The knowledge Yasmin gained from Girls Shine had a profound impact on her. She invited other girls from her community to join and shared her learnings with her family, particularly about the harms of early marriage. Her advocacy inspired her parents to attend caregiver sessions, leading them to understand the importance of a

supportive environment for teenage girls. As a result, they allowed Yasmin to resume her education. Now in class six, she aspires to work at WGSS in the future, spreading the transformative power of education and

power of education and community engagement.
Yasmin's journey from awareness to advocacy highlights the impact of the Girls Shine Curriculum and WGSS, supported by the Australian Humanitarian Partnership and implemented by CARE Bangladesh and Mukti Cox's Bazar.

- 5) Deliver adult literacy and resource sessions for Father's Clubs.
- 6) Organize quarterly meetings with men's club facilitators.
- 7) Arrange quarterly meetings with religious and traditional leaders to encourage the implementation of action plans.
- 8) Provide trauma-informed, survivor-centered GBV case management services, including MHPSS and referral services for women and girls.
- 9) Conduct recreational activities with women and girls.
- 10) Link leaders from young married women groups with local Women's Rights Organizations (WROs) and train them on leadership and evidence-based advocacy action plans.
- 11) Provide resources to local WROs and Youth-Led Organizations (YLOs) to strengthen their institutional capacity and develop advocacy action plans.
- 12) Form and activate Community Clinic and Facility Management Committees, ensuring the inclusion and leadership of young women and adolescent girls and boys.

Strengthening Local Capacity:

Mukti Cox's Bazar

Empowers Youth led Community Organizations

in Cox's Bazar



To accelerate and streamline the LEAP project's activities, Mukti Cox's Bazar has partnered with two local organizations: Swadhinata Jubo Samity, which focuses on women's rights, and Arnab Cox's Bazar, which works with youth. The project operates in seven unions and benefits adolescent girls, young women, and women. To ensure the sustainability of these changes, the LEAP project has integrated Swadhinata Jubo Samity and Arnab Cox's Bazar into its framework. To enhance their capacity, the project has organized various training sessions on sexual and reproductive health, gender, and gender-based violence. These trainings have equipped the organizations with the necessary skills to continue their work effectively.

As a result, these organizations are becoming proficient in their work and will continue the project activities in their respective areas. The project conducted a thorough needs assessment to identify the skills required by these organizations, based on which the trainings were organized. Additionally, the project provided various materials to enhance their organizational capabilities. Arnab Cox's Bazar received 3 computers, 3 UPS units, 1 printer, 1 meeting table, 3 foam chairs, 1 bookshelf, 2 notice boards, and 20 visitor chairs. Swadhinata Jubo Samity received 3 office tables, 3 revolving chairs, 1 meeting table, 1 bookshelf, and ceiling fans.

These materials are not only strengthening the organizational capacity of the two entities but also making their work more efficient and dynamic. The Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar and the Project Manager of the LEAP Project from Plan International Bangladesh were present during the distribution of these materials.

Mukti Cox's Bazar's

LEAP Project Reaches Over 24,000 People

with Street Plays on SRHR and GBV

Among the various methods to influence human behaviour, street drama stands out as particularly effective. This medium allows messages to reach a large audience simultaneously, and viewers often see reflections of their own lives in the performances, making the awareness impactful. The interactive nature of street drama engages the audience in a way that other mediums often cannot, fostering a deeper understanding and connection to the issues presented.

This year, the LEAP Project by Mukti Cox's Bazar organized 70 street plays across different villages in 7 unions of Ramu upazila, reaching approximately 24,138 people. The plays addressed critical topics such as adolescent sexual and reproductive health, child marriage, gender-based violence, and its effects, as well as information on where women can access free health services. These performances were highly significant to the audiences, providing not only awareness but also a sense of community and shared experience.

During the plays, members of the Union Parishad, women members, and other distinguished individuals were present, lending their support and credibility to the events. The plays were held in village homes, making them accessible to everyone, and creating a friendly setting where community members could gather and engage with the content. In many areas of Ramu upazila, awareness about adolescent health, gender-based violence, and child marriage is still low. Therefore, these dramas were organized to raise awareness and understanding of these critical issues, using relatable characters and scenarios to drive home important messages.

The success of these street dramas highlights the power of culturally relevant and community-based approaches in addressing sensitive topics and promoting positive change. By bringing these issues to the forefront in a familiar and engaging format, the LEAP Project has made significant strides in educating and empowering the community.



Championing Change

Sushmita's Journey to Empowerment


Sushmita (pseudonym), an 18-year-old 10th-grade student, comes from an area with low literacy rates and limited awareness, education, and access to services. When she was in the sixth grade, she noticed that boys bullied girls at school and on their way home. No one protested or raised their voice against it, so she assumed it was normal. Sushmita experienced similar incidents but never dared to share them with anyone, not even her family, fearing they would stop her schooling. When she disclosed in a friend, she was encouraged to report it to a teacher but was too afraid of the teacher's reaction. To avoid the situation, she would skip school for a few days.

In the 10th grade, Sushmita met Sumaiya, a mentor from the LEAP project, who invited her to join the CoC sessions. She accepted and found 19 other girls attending the first session. Curious about the follow-up sessions, she continued attending. "I don't know why, but it felt like the sessions were good for me. Every time after a session, I came home and discussed with my mother and sister what I learned. As I shared my learnings with my sister, my family encouraged me to join the sessions regularly," Sushmita recalls.



From the session on Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV), she learned about the various forms of GBV in her community and that only girls and women are victims. "I realized that even the harassment I faced from boys on the way to school was a form of GBV, but I had never raised my voice against it. This session opened my eyes and helped me distinguish between GBV and harassment. I felt sorry for myself during those times; why could I not raise my voice against those boys? Why didn't I call anyone for help? Why didn't I tell our teachers? Why didn't I talk about this with my mother? These questions kept coming to mind." The sessions also provided practical information on emergency numbers to report cases and taught her about "stranger danger," such as avoiding gifts from outsider males. After completing all the sessions, Sushmita gained the courage to raise awareness among other girls in her community about GBV and the steps to take if they faced similar situations.

"I am very happy to have completed the eight sessions of Champion of Change by the LEAP project. It is a very important initiative for adolescent girls and boys to understand our physical and mental changes. Without knowing this information, we can fall into any danger. I am proud to see my transformation as a girl. I would say this is the turning point of my new life. Above all, thanks to the LEAP project and Plan International Bangladesh for providing CoC sessions for adolescents," concludes Sushmita.



I am Hanif Jihadi, a businessman from Kawarkhop bazar. In our area, child marriage is a common issue. We used to think that child marriage guaranteed girls lives. We get invited as guests to participate in the marriage in our area. We go there and pray for the boy and girl and participate in the fellowship lunch. This is usually common for us and our area. But a discussion has changed my point of view about child marriage. A few days ago, a person invited me to join a men's club session.



First, I was puzzled about whether to join or not because I have business in the local market. If I join the session, I have to complete eight sessions in eight days, which could be a loss for my business. I noticed that some of my known people had already joined that group, so they also invited me to join them. I could not ignore them. This is how I became a member of the men's club session at Kawarkhop Union. We were in total 20 members and regularly meet in my house courtyard. The facilitator was so good at facilitating; our group enjoyed the session topics. Sessions were attractive because the facilitators discussed the issues with real-time examples. One day it was session no. 5, facilitator discussion about child marriage. So, everyone is sharing their own views about child marriage and relating them to religious quotes and instructions. Everyone in the group was supporting child marriage. In our area, child marriage means when a girl becomes 14–16, she gets out of her marriage. It is the perfect age for a girl to get married. And this is already happening in our society.

The facilitator also agreed that, yeah, this is how child marriage is actually happening in our society. We are not aware of its long-term impact on a girl or of its impact on our society. We actually wonder what long-term impact could happen to a girl and how our society is being affected by child marriage. The facilitator should take some time and draw a girl's picture. In the picture, he writes about the adverse effects of child marriage and how it affects a girl. The discussion was so interesting and covered topics totally new to us. So, I said, "What we understood a long time ago about child marriage was wrong." I thanked the facilitator for giving us the true picture, and all of us present in the session vowed not to spoil a girl's life for child marriage. A few days later, I got an invitation to attend a marriage ceremony in my neighborhood. I observed that a 16-year-old girl is about to get married. I called the girl's parents and asked them to bring her birth registration card.

And I was confirmed that the girl's age is 16, so I started to have discussions with her parents about various harmful aspects of child marriage and her future suffering. Moreover, the BD law about punishment, marriage age, and others is declared in the law. It was not so easy to make girls parents understand, but at last they agreed with me and promised not to give their girls marriage before 18. The girls smiled and thanked me for giving them a new life. I would like to give big thanks to Mukti Cox's Bazar LEAP Project for giving me such an opportunity to participate in the session. But please include more people with this activity; like me, there are also lots of people who don't know about the topics we received.

Day-Long Campaign Raises Awareness and Promotes Action Against Sexual Exploitation, Abuse, and Harassment in Cox's Bazar

On June 30, 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar organized a comprehensive day-long campaign as part of their PSEAH project, targeting the Rohingya community in Camp 4, Camp 10, and Palongkhali Union. The campaign focused on Protection from Sexual Exploitation, Abuse, and Harassment (PSEAH), aiming to raise awareness and promote preventive actions within the community. The primary goal was to educate the Rohingya community about their rights and responsibilities, empower individuals to stand against exploitation, and foster a safe and supportive environment. Key objectives included raising awareness about the risks and impacts of sexual exploitation, abuse, and harassment, promoting victim-centered approaches, empowering community members, especially female representatives, to speak out against exploitation, and strengthening reporting mechanisms. The campaign featured speeches by community leaders, the distribution of T-shirts with impactful slogans, oath-taking ceremonies, rallies, and the promotion of key messages. These activities were designed to engage and educate the community, ensuring they are aware of and can access safe reporting channels for incidents of SEAH. The campaign was well-received, with significant participation from community members, including Union Parishad members, women representatives, and other distinguished individuals.

Hope Illuminated: Emergency Preparedness through lighting and crafting future: Addressing Sustainable livelihoods, social cohesion, and Gender Inequality through integrated community led action

- 3) Organize an advocacy meeting with local government institutions and administration at the Cox's Bazar level on strengthening social protection for host women in Bangladesh.
- 4) Conduct a community consultation to identify and prioritize household solar lighting preferences, including input from elderly men and women, persons with disabilities, and community leaders.
- 5) Distribute essential protection non-food items (NFIs), including household lighting devices such as desk lamps and handheld torch lights, in Camps 12, 19, 22, and Hnila Union.



GOOD HEALTH AND WELLBEING

To align with SDG Goal 3, "Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages," Mukti Cox's Bazar is focusing on community-based health programs include health education, case management, basic health screenings, facilitating access to services, immunization, and referrals. These initiatives are crucial for enhancing and expanding healthcare within the community. Currently, Mukti Cox's Bazar runs several programs, including the Community Health Outreach Program, Malaria Elimination Program, ENRICH Program, and Uplifting Livelihood of the Elderly Program. These programs contribute to the community's health and well-being through activities such as raising awareness, organizing eye camps, satellite clinics, maternal and child healthcare, family planning, nutrition, tobacco use prevention, and adolescent sexual and reproductive health education.

The International Organization for Migration (IOM) has supported Mukti Cox's Bazar in implementing a "Community-Based Health Outreach Program (CHOP)" in Ukhiya, Cox's Bazar district. This initiative benefits both Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMN) and host communities by enhancing healthcare facilities and raising health awareness through community involvement. The CHOP project operates in 9 refugee camps and 5 host unions under Ukhia Upazila, offering services such as hygiene promotion, sexual and reproductive health rights (SRHR), sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) prevention, health education, and awareness through courtyard sessions and household visits. It also includes data collection on mortality and morbidity, newborn notifications, mapping and profiling of pregnant mothers to ensure antenatal and postnatal care, institutional deliveries, family planning motivation, screening for communicable and non-communicable diseases, palliative care, and referrals for severe and moderate acute malnutrition.

The "Malaria Elimination Program," funded by the Global Fund and support by BRAC, which aims to eliminate malaria in Bangladesh by 2030. Mukti Cox's Bazar has pioneered this campaign in the host communities of Cox's Bazar Sadar and Ramu Upazila. The ENRICH program operates satellite clinics and organizes special eye care campaigns for the community. These initiatives provide essential healthcare services, including eye examinations, treatments, and surgeries, ensuring that community members have access to quality eye care. Additionally, the program offers a range of other health services, such as maternal and child healthcare, family planning, nutrition education, and adolescent reproductive health. By addressing various health needs, Mukti Cox's Bazar plays a vital role in improving the overall well-being of the community.

Celebrated World AIDS Day 2023

The Community Health Outreach Project observed significant international days, particularly "World AIDS Day," in collaboration with the government to raise awareness among both Rohingya refugees and host communities. The project aimed to disseminate knowledge to various community groups, including women, men, and adolescents, through awareness sessions conducted by Community Health Workers (CHWs) and Community Health Volunteers (CHVs) in courtyard meetings.

World AIDS Day was celebrated on December 2nd and 3rd, 2023, with the theme "Let Communities Lead." Although World AIDS Day is officially on December 1st, the celebration was moved due to a holiday. The sessions began with community members from the project's coverage area, where CHWs and CHVs conducted 50 awareness sessions, reaching 523 beneficiaries.

Mr. Ranjan Barua Rajan, Upazila Health and Family Planning Officer of Ukhiya, inaugurated the session for the Adolescent Boys Group, discussing HIV/AIDS and its impact, particularly in the Rohingya refugee camps in Cox's Bazar. He emphasized the importance of safety and spreading awareness. The session on December 2nd was facilitated by CHW Shahina Akter from Rajapalong Union. Additionally, the project team participated in a rally at the Upazilla Health Complex in Ukhiya on World AIDS Day, organized by the Upazilla Health Complex with support from IOM, BRAC, RTMI, PHD, and Mukti Cox's Bazar.

A significant initiative by project staff (Blood Donation Unit)

In order to prevent maternal death and infant death to achieve SDG, the staff of Community based health outreach program implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar with the funding of International Organization for Migration (IOM) to the way to attain the goal that not a single pregnant mother falls into the risk of death due to lack of blood, expressed determination to proceed with voluntary blood donation at an urgent moment. On 13/03/2024, an emergency discussion meeting was held as part of the blood donation program at the concerned project office of Mukti Cox's Bazar. Sheikh Jahangir Hussain, National Program Officer (IP) and Dr. Tabassum Poli, Clinical Supervisor were present on behalf of IOM. On the other hand, all the senior officers and supervisors including Mr. Lutful Kabir Chowdhury, Deputy Chief Executive and Mr. Sujan Mahmud Jamal, Project Coordinator from Mukti Cox's Bazar were present. According to the decision of the said meeting on 18-03-2024 Dr. Tabassum Poli along with all senior officers and supervisors. Later the supervisors trained 196 staff and volunteers and formed a separate "Mukti Blood Donation Unit" comprising all the projects of Mukti Cox's Bazar, 212 staff and volunteers to carry out the following functions. Among the decided tasks to be undertaken by the team were: creating awareness in the community about the benefits of blood donation especially in Rohingya camps, creating the opportunity of free blood group diagnosis from IOM health post at the camp level, preparing list with mobile numbers of interested blood donors and beneficiaries, preparing list with blood group of all project staff and volunteers, ensuring blood donation to the host and Rohingya patients covered by the project at the moment of emergency, especially blood donation during delivery for pregnant mothers, referral to hospitals with blood donors in case of risky deliveries, blood donation to blood banks for helpless and urgent patients, celebration of World Blood Donor Day (June 14-2024) and prepared blood donation weekly report and submitted to IOM. Notably, "Mukti Blood Donation Unit" has already completed the blood donation program for 10 pregnant mothers and saving 2 critical patients including 8 Rohingya beneficiaries.

- Utilize Rapid Diagnostic Tests (RDTs) to quickly identify malaria infections, facilitating prompt and effective medical intervention.
- Conduct regular household visits to disseminate health messages, collect household information, and educate community members on preventive health practices.
- 4) Organize courtyard meetings to engage community members in discussions about health issues, promote awareness, and encourage community participation in health initiatives.
- 5) Distribution of Long-Lasting Insecticidal Nets (LLINs) to households to prevent mosquito bites and reduce the incidence of malaria.
- Conduct detailed investigations of malaria cases to identify sources of infection, track transmission patterns, and implement control measures.
- 7) Celebrate International Malaria Day 2024 by organizing events and activities to raise awareness about malaria prevention and control, and to highlight the importance of community involvement in combating the disease.

Mukti Cox's Bazar Observes World Malaria Day 2024

Mukti Cox's Bazar observed World Malaria Day 2024 in Sadar and Ramu Upazila, supported by the Malaria Elimination project. The theme for this year was "Accelerating the fight against malaria for a more equitable world." In line with this theme, a rally and discussion were held on the observation day. The program was presided over by Civil Surgeon Dr. Asif Ahmmed Howlader, with Upazila Health and Family Planning Officer (Sadar), Dr. Titu Chandra Sheel and Deputy Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, Syed Lulful Kabir Chowdhury, attended as special guests. Representatives from various organizations and nursing students, totalling around 100 participants, joined the event to ensure its success.

During the discussion, the guests highlighted the history of malaria, explaining that it is an acute febrile illness caused by Plasmodium parasites, transmitted through the bites of infected female Anopheles mosquitoes. They emphasized that malaria is both preventable and curable. Nearly half of the world's population is at risk of malaria, with an estimated 249 million people contracting the disease in 85 countries in 2022 alone. That same year, approximately 608,000 lives were lost to malaria. The speakers stressed the importance of awareness and treatment, noting that malaria continues to have a devastating impact on health and livelihoods worldwide. They urged everyone to stay informed about malaria and its prevention and treatment.

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Food Security and Livelihood

Mukti Cox's Bazar aims to strengthen the security and resilience of vulnerable communities, including disadvantaged and displaced groups, by improving food security and livelihoods through better market and agricultural services, support for small businesses, and climate change and disaster risk reduction efforts for the period of 2024-2028. Refugees, who are wholly dependent on humanitarian aid, and the host community, which faces rising food insecurity, benefit from these initiatives. By providing cash support, Mukti Cox's Bazar helps rebuild climate smart agriculture and creates job opportunities, leveraging existing skills to meet local demands. The organization's comprehensive approach includes training and support for income-generating activities, ensuring that both communities can achieve greater selfsufficiency. Additionally, Mukti Cox's Bazar's commitment to the Sustainable Development Goals of No Poverty and Zero Hunger underscores its dedication to long-term solutions. Through these efforts, the organization not only improves food security but also enhances livelihood resilience and reduces disaster vulnerability, showcasing its pivotal role in fostering sustainable development in the region.

Successful Distribution of 600 Black Bengal Goats Boosts Livelihoods

for 300 Host Beneficiaries in Ukhiya Upazila

The Income Generating Activities (IGA) initiative for the host community focused on goat rearing, proving to be a promising venture. The project supported 300 households, including 286 female and 14 male beneficiaries. The IPCoSO Project in Mukti Cox's Bazar marked a significant milestone with the successful distribution of 600 Black Bengal Goats to 300 host beneficiaries in Rajapalong and Palongkhali Union, Ukhiya Upazila. Each of the 200 beneficiaries in Rajapalong and 100 in Palongkhali received two goats, enhancing their livelihoods. The event began with an inspiring speech by Mr. Imran Hussain Sajib, the Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) of Ukhiya Upazila. Distinguished guests, including Dr. Polash Chandraa Ray

Livestock Officer), (Upazila Mr. Sayeed Mohammed Anower Hossain (President of Ukhiya Press Club), Mr. Farukh Hossain (Former General Secretary), Sower Kamal (UP Member), Abeda Sultana (Project Officer), and others, attended the event. Mr. Osman Gani, the Project Coordinator, provided guidance and support throughout the event, proudly announcing the distribution of 600 goats. Beneficiaries expressed joy and gratitude, recognizing the opportunity to boost their income and nutritional well-being. The project's Technical Officer (Livelihood and Monitoring) diligently oversaw the distribution process, with active participation from Technical Officer-DVM, Community Facilitators, and Livelihood Promoters, fostering engagement and collaboration among beneficiaries.

The project supported 300 households, including 286 female and 14 male beneficiaries. Gender-Inclusive Agricultural Support

Empowers Camp Beneficiaries

with Sustainable Practices and Essential Resources

The IPCoSO project focused promoting agricultural sustainability camp community, within the launched a comprehensive initiative to support beneficiaries growing vegetables within their limited homestead areas. In the first quarter of 2023, particularly for the Kharif season, project provided agricultural resources to 4,000 camp beneficiaries (379 males and 3,621 females). These resources included seeds, seedlings, compost, vermicompost, sex-pheromone traps, glue sticks, bamboo, green fencing nets, rope, roof nets, watering cans, hand sprayers, jute sack bags, and more. This initiative aims to foster an inclusive and holistic approach to vegetable production in homestead gardens.



During the Robi season, we provided agricultural inputs to 2,075 camp beneficiaries, including 248 males and a significant majority of 1,827 females, highlighting our commitment to gender-inclusive agricultural support. The distribution was precisely organized across various camps: 100 beneficiaries from Camp 1W, 100 from Camp 2W, 300 from Camp 3, 1,001 from Camp 4, 103 from Camp 4Ext, and 471 from Camp 17. Beneficiaries received seedlings of vegetables such as Bottle Gourd, Bitter Gourd, Papaya, Ridge Gourd, and Sweet Gourd, tailored for both the Kharif and Robi seasons. To promote environmentally friendly pest and disease management, we provided sex pheromone traps, yellow traps, and vermicompost. These initiatives aimed not only to address insect and disease issues but also to enhance soil health in the beneficiaries' vegetable gardens. By supplying essential resources and emphasizing sustainable practices, the project aligns with our broader commitment to promoting eco-friendly agriculture within the camp community.





IPCoSO Project organized

Host and FDMN Camp-Level Learning Sharing and Closing Workshops

The IPCoSO Project conducted learning sharing and closing workshops at Camp 4, 4Ext, Camp 17, and the UNO conference room for the host community on December 12, 14, and 20, 2023, respectively. These workshops aimed to bring together a diverse group of participants, including CiC, Assistant CiC, camp representatives, FSS-related NGO delegates, selected beneficiaries, and media professionals from both print and electronic platforms. Government officials from Ukhiya Upazila and the project team from Mukti Cox's Bazar actively participated in these enlightening sessions.

The workshops were honoured by the presence of Camp in Charge of 4 and 4Ext, Md. Tariqul Islam, Mst. Nikhat Ara, and Assistant Camp in Charge of Camp 4, 4Ext, and 17, Md. Abu Bokkar Siddique, Haricharan Chowdhury, and Md. Habibur Akter. Mr. Syed Lutful Kabir Chowdhury, Deputy Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, presided over the events at the Upazila level. For the host event, Mr. Tanvir Hossain, Upazila Nirbahi Officer, attended as Chief Guest, alongside Upazila Mohila Vice Chairman Kamrunnesa Baby and Mr. Syed Mohammad Anwar, President of Ukhiya Press Club, who joined as special guests.

A total of 108 participants (78 males, 30 females) attended the camp event, and 54 participants (43 males, 11 females) attended the host event. These workshops aimed to facilitate knowledge exchange, skill sharing, and reflections on the experiences, successes, and challenges encountered during the reporting year. Project Coordinator Md. Osman Gani provided a comprehensive overview of the project's learnings, successes, challenges, and strategies to overcome them through a dynamic and interactive PowerPoint presentation. The discussion session featured valuable contributions from various NGO delegates and project staff of Mukti Cox's Bazar.

Participants shared their opinions with the IPCoSO Project, acknowledging the successful completion of the project in collaboration with respective Camp Authorities. Beneficiaries actively participated, sharing their perspectives. Key learnings highlighted the extensive use of fallow land, the promotion and adoption of climate-smart agricultural technologies for sustainability, the feasibility of meeting nutritional requirements through homestead vegetable gardening, and the optimization of land usage through vertical gardening structures, which provide temperature regulation for efficient crop production. Challenges were also acknowledged, such as the vulnerability of vegetables to water showers during the late monsoon, interpersonal conflicts among beneficiaries hindering progress in vegetable cultivation, the lack of quality agricultural inputs in the local market, and water scarcity for vegetable gardening in the Kharif season.

Empowering Change:

Hajira Khatun's Success Story in Goat Rearing

Hajira Khatun, a resident of Madhur Chara village in Rajapalong union of Ukhiya Upazila, Cox's Bazar district, faced significant challenges due to poverty. As the sixth child in her family, she could only pursue education up to the 4th grade. At the age of 14, she married Md. Kashem, the son of an equally impoverished family in the same village. Living on her husband's meager income from day labor, Hajira struggled as she became the mother of seven children.

In January 2021, a transformative opportunity came through the Improving Peaceful Co-existence and Selfreliance Opportunities for Refugees and Host Community (IPCoSO) Project, initiated by Mukti Cox's Bazar and supported by UNHCR. Hajira enrolled as a beneficiary representing the host communities. The project provided her with a 3-day training session on goat rearing, a skill that would soon become her pathway out of poverty. Following the training, she received two goats from the project. Armed with newfound knowledge, determination, and hard work, Hajira began to rear and sell goats. The income generated from this venture marked a turning point in her life. Gradually, her financial struggles diminished, enabling her to provide nutritious food and clothing for her children. Encouraged by the increasing demand for goats, she intensified her focus on goat rearing. To date, she has earned BDT 60,000 from selling goats and currently maintains a flock of 22 goats. Hajira's life has transformed, and she now experiences joy and contentment alongside her husband and children. Her dream of overcoming poverty is becoming a reality through her dedication to livestock rearing and hard work. Grateful for the support received, Hajira extends her thanks to all the officers and field staff of Mukti Cox's Bazar and UNHCR. She recognizes that her dream is not solely her own but is shared by Mukti Cox's Bazar and UNHCR, united in the mission to eradicate poverty. Hajira aspires to continue building on her success by leveraging her growing livestock and hard work, contributing to the collective vision of a poverty-free community.

As part of the DFAT AHP Bangladesh Rohingya Response Phase IV Inclusive project, implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar with technical support from Oxfam in Bangladesh and funded by DFAT AHP IV, an 8-day skill development training on handicrafts and block boutiques was conducted from April 21 to 28, 2024. This training took place at the Naf Agro Limited center in front of Hnila Union Parishad and the Oxfam shed at Camp-12, targeting both host beneficiaries in Hnila Union of Teknaf Upazila and Rohingya beneficiaries in Camp-12. The objective was to generate family income through the support of the project.

At the conclusion of the training, a closing ceremony was organized by Mukti Cox's Bazar. The event was presided over by Md. Rashed Mahmud Ali, Chairman of Hnila Union Parishad, and Mr. Mohammad, Assistant Camp in Charge (ACiC) of Camp-12. The chief guest was Md. Arfanul Haque Chowdhury, Acting Upazila Nirbahi Officer, with special guests including the Assistant Commissioner (Land) of Teknaf, Cox's Bazar, Syed Lutful Kabir Chowdhury, Deputy Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, CMA Md. Afaj Uddin, Programme Manager of Oxfam in Bangladesh, Md. Mostafa Ali, Project Officer EFSVL, and Mr. Iqbal Faruque.

A total of 100 host and Rohingya beneficiaries participated in the training, which was conducted by a hired handicraft trainer from the GBViE project. The training covered various topics, including tie-dye, block printing, patchwork, and crafting jute handbags. The entire program was moderated by Project Coordinator Md. Foysal Bari.

Setara's Journey to Entrepreneurship

Empowering Change: Setara's Journey to Entrepreneurship Setara, a resilient woman entrepreneur from Camp-19, has become an inspiration with the support of Mukti Cox's Bazar. Her journey began with a simple yet powerful idea: to transform her life and community through small-scale initiatives. With the training, technical assistance, and input support provided by Mukti Cox's Bazar, Setara embarked on a venture to sell vegetables, which soon flourished into a sustainable source of income. Her success in vegetable selling has not only restored her family's solvency but also ignited her ambition to expand further. Setara now dreams of starting a small-scale poultry farm, using the earnings from her vegetable business.





This initiative, she believes, will serve as a model for others in the camp, demonstrating that with empowerment and a little help, significant change is possible. Setara's gratitude towards Mukti Cox's Bazar is profound. She acknowledges that the training and support she received were pivotal in her journey towards self-reliance. Her story is a testament to the impact of community-based support programs and the potential they hold to transform lives. Setara's journey is not just her own; it is a shared success that inspires many others to pursue their dreams and build a better future.



Naju Hossain, 55, fled from the Mungdu district of Myanmar to Bangladesh in 2017 due to torture by the Burmese army. Initially, he took shelter at a relative's house in the Nayapara Registered Camp in Teknaf, Cox's Bazar. He later settled in Block A of Camp 19 and currently, he resides there with his three sons and two daughters.

Naju works as a day labourer but struggles to find daily employment. His wife, a housewife, manages all household activities efficiently. In Myanmar, Naju was involved in agriculture, but he is currently unemployed. The support provided by the humanitarian aid organizations is insufficient for his family to live comfortably.

While spending idle time, Naju was approached by Mukti Cox's Bazar's project staff and select him as a beneficiary for homestead gardening and pit composting under the DFAT AHP IV project. He received two days of training on vegetable cultivation in homestead areas and advanced technology. After the training, he received various agricultural inputs and tools for his home gardening activities, including vegetable seeds, organic fertilizer, fencing net, bamboo, geo bags, plastic rope, yellow traps, Jorna (e.g., Jhajri in Bangla), sex pheromone traps and 3 types of vegetable saplings. Then he successfully applied these tools in his home gardening activities. He produced a significant quantity of vegetables, which were used for both household consumption and sales. During the Robi season, he sold vegetables worth BDT 7,350. With part of this income, he purchased seven chickens for BDT 3,850, which he now rears at home. Naju is now busy tending to his vegetable garden, taking care of his chickens, and looking after his children.

A happy and confident Naju Hossain shared, "While in the Mungdu district of Myanmar, we also engaged in agriculture, but we couldn't produce sufficient vegetables due to a lack of appropriate cultivation techniques. We only consumed what we grew and couldn't sell any surplus. From the training, I learned improved techniques for vegetable cultivation, and by applying these, I succeeded in my home gardening activities." His neighbours are interested in visiting his homestead garden and observing his incomegenerating activities. They often ask him about his success and the improved techniques he uses in his vegetable gardening. He is very grateful to Australian Aid, Oxfam in Bangladesh, and Mukti Cox's Bazar for their excellent support and regular technical advice.

Struggle to Self-Reliance

Ms. Ayesha Begum, residing in Morichaghona, Ward #1, Hnila Union, faced significant challenges when her husband remarried and neglected his responsibilities towards her and their family. Initially, Ayesha struggled to support her family and fund her three children's education by cultivating a mere 10 decimals of land and working as a day laborer on other farmers' lands. The financial strain was immense, making it difficult to provide for her family's basic needs.

A turning point came when Ayesha became a participant of livelihood improvement project supported by IVY JAPAN and Ministry of Foreign Affairs Japan, receiving essential support and training. This intervention significantly enhanced her skills and boosted her confidence. With knowledge, resources and technical support from project staff, Ayesha expanded her vegetable cultivation to 40 decimals of leased land. Her hardworking efforts generated a significant income of BDT 180,000, with BDT 140,000 derived from vegetable farming and BDT 40,000 from poultry. With these earnings, she not only managed her family's expenses but also purchased a cow, ensuring a steady source of income.

Ayesha's success has transformed her life. She can now afford nutritious food for her family and continue her children's education. Moreover, she has gained the ability to make decisions for her family, and her husband has started to respect her opinions and spend more time with the family. Ayesha expresses her heartfelt gratitude to Mukti Cox's Bazar and IVY Japan for the support, which has empowered her to achieve self-reliance and improve her family's quality of life.



Ms. Senowara Begum, a resident of Choto Lechua Prang, Ward #6, Hnila, has transformed her life with the support of livelihood improvement project (LIP). Utilizing the technical and input assistance provided, she ventured into poultry farming, selling chickens and eggs. Her hard work and dedication paid off, earning her an impressive BDT 147,000.

With this income, Senowara made a strategic investment by purchasing a cow for BDT 45,000. This valuable asset has already produced results, with the cow recently giving birth to a calf. Senowara now anticipates further increasing her income through milk sales, thereby diversifying her household's income source.

Senowara's journey from poultry farming to owning livestock shows the significant impact of targeted support and training. Her story is a shining example of how resource and determination, coupled with the right assistance, can lead to sustainable economic growth and improved living conditions. Senowara expresses her heartfelt gratitude for the project's support, which has enabled her to secure a brighter future for herself and her family.



Enhancing Market Access for Small-scale Farmer's (EMASF) in Hilly and Mountainous Areas in Teknaf, Cox's Bazar

Goal:

This project targets small-scale farmers in the hilly and mountainous areas of Teknaf, Bangladesh aiming them out of poverty through pavement rehabilitation and strengthening their marketing skills, and 'expanding productivity' by improving irrigation systems and their agricultural technical skills.

Outcome:

- Agricultural products are shipped using the developed roads.
- Joint shipments begin. Farmers have learnt about the market mechanisms and sell their products more effectively.
- To grow agricultural products using irrigation water
- Farmers' agricultural techniques improved.

Coverage Area:

Whykong Union, Tekanf, Cox's Bazar

Population coverage:

1475 (Female-760 and male-715), 250 households

- 1) Improving market access through road construction and pavement maintenance
- 2) Providing training on vegetable cultivation, nursery and composting, poultry farming and vaccination etc. to improve productivity.
- 3) Strengthen marketing through orientation and training among the project participants on distribution mechanisms, how to use scales, how to keep books, the terms of use of collection points, and the benefits of joint shipping.

Upazila Level Inception Workshop

On June 11, 2024, EMASF Project by Mukti Cox's Bazar held a highly impactful Inception Workshop at the Teknaf Upazila Hall Room. This event brought together a diverse group of participants, including representatives from various NGO organizations, delegates media professionals from both print and electronic platforms. Government officials from Teknaf Upazila, UP Chairman and members of Whykong Union and the project team from Mukti Cox's Bazar actively engaged in this enlightening session. The workshop was honored by the presence of Mr. Syed Lutful Kabir Chowdhury,



Deputy Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, who presided over the event. The Chief Guest, Mr. Adnan Chowdhury, Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO), was accompanied by several special guests, including Upazila Engineer Rabiul Hossain, Upazila Rural Development Officer (URDO) Cinnmoy Barua Manas, Project Implementation Officer (PIO) Habibur Rahman and Agricultural Extension Officer (AEO) Md. Morshedul Alam. A total of 35 participants (33 men and 2 women) attended the workshop, which aimed to share vital project information, service modalities, beneficiary details, project insights and the organizational mandate. Project Coordinator Md. Osman Gani delivered a dynamic and interactive PowerPoint presentation, providing a comprehensive overview of the project's modality and the organizational mission. He elaborated on how Mukti Cox's Bazar is implementing the EMASF Project with funding from IVY Japan across wards 1, 2, 4, 5, and 9 of Whykong Union.

The project includes training on vegetable production for 250 families in Whykong Union, along with the provision of seeds, compost holes, chicken houses, native hens and native chickens. Additionally, 693 meters of paved roads will be constructed to improve the market.

Seedling Raising training



The Enhancing Market Access for Small-scale Farmers (EMASF) project, implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar with support from IVY Japan and funded by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Japan, aims to improve the livelihoods of small-scale farmers in the hilly and mountainous areas of Teknaf, Bangladesh. Running from March 1, 2024, to February 28, 2025, the project focuses on alleviating poverty through infrastructure improvements, enhanced marketing skills, and increased agricultural productivity via better irrigation systems and technical skills.

As part of the project, a Seedling Raising Nursery training was organized to build capacity among the beneficiaries. A total of 250 participants, including 54 males and 196 females from Wards 1, 2, 4, 5, and 9, attended the training. The sessions were facilitated by a dedicated team comprising the Senior Technical Officer-Agriculture, Technical Officer-Marketing, and community mobilizers, ensuring comprehensive coverage of all key points. The Project Coordinator dynamically oversaw the entire training, ensuring smooth execution and addressing any participant queries.

The training covered various topics, including the importance and types of nurseries, seedbed location and preparation, soil and seed treatment, alternative methods, seedbed covering, seedling size, use of seedling trays, uses of cocopeat, vermicompost production technology, compost manure production technology, and disease control. The combined efforts of the facilitation team and the oversight provided by the Project Coordinator contributed to the overall success of the training program, promising a transformative impact on the livelihoods of small-scale farmers in Teknaf.

Artemia 4 Bangladesh Project

<u>Goal:</u>

The overall objective of the Artemia4Bangladesh project is to enhance agricultural and food systems in the Cox's Bazar area of Bangladesh.

Objectives:

The specific objective is to increased productivity of salt producers and aquaculture farmers linked to Artemia-related innovative initiatives in the Cox´s Bazar area. The project aims to build capacity through demonstration, training, research and innovation.

Coverage Area:

Moheshali Upazila and Chawfaldandi Union in Cox's Bazar

Population coverage:

89 Fish culture farmers Women-50, Men-39

Major Activities in the reporting year:

- 1) Integrate Artemia cysts and biomass into aquaculture production in salt farms and recirculation systems in shrimp hatcheries.
- 2) Provide training salt/fish farmers, hatchery technicians, local service providers and young professionals.
- 3) Fish fry distributed to homestead ponds farmers
- 4) Shrimp fish fry distributed to nursery ponds.
- 5) Fish food and other inputs such as lime, UREA, and TSP distributed homestead ponds
- 6) Support to process and use locally produced Artemia cysts and biomass, improve seed quality and availability, and use hatchery/nursery rearing techniques



During Visit to Moheshkhali

On December 13, 2023, Petrit Sargegal, a representative of the European Union, visited the Artemia for Bangladesh project at Moheshkhali upazila. This project is implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar with technical support from World Fish in Belgium. During his visit, he exchanged views with Artemia farmers. He was accompanied by Dr. Mizanur Rahman, Team Leader of the Artemia for Bangladesh project, along with Rezaul Hoque and Shariful Islam, Research Assistants from World Fish.

The team was impressed by the efficiency of the Artemia farmers and the success of their fish farming efforts. Petrit Sargegal inquired about the farmers' practice of growing vegetables on the banks of the ponds alongside fish farming. He provided guidance to help the farmers become more successful in Artemia farming. He also informed them that Artemia cultivation in Bangladesh has promising prospects, with demand expected to rise in the near future. With proper management, Artemia farming could boost family incomes and meet the country's nutritional needs.

The fish farmers who attended the discussion requested increased cooperation in fish farming moving forward.


The Inspiring Journey of Ranu Ara

Mrs. Ranu Ara's transformation from a housewife to a successful pond fish farmer in Moheshkhali, Cox's Bazar, is truly inspiring. Since 1992, her family of five had been engaged in traditional fish farming and unrefined salt production on their half-acre land in Lombaghona. However, over the past three years, the salt business became increasingly unprofitable, leading to financial hardship. Seeking ways to support her family, Ranu attended a seminar organized by the Artemia for Bangladesh project in 2022. Inspired by the seminar, she decided to start fish farming in a pond to generate profit. She learned about crucial factors such as sufficient reservoir density, proper feeding, water quality, and pond management, which are essential for profitable and sustainable fish farming.

In 2022, Ranu began her fish farming venture on a 405 square meter pond, producing 188 kilograms of fish in the first year. This success motivated her to continue, and in 2023, she increased her production to 192 kilograms, with the survival rate of the fish improving from 50% to 85-90%.

Ranu not only keeps fish for her family's consumption but also sells the surplus to neighboring farmers and local markets with her husband's help, providing an additional source of income for her family. Her journey from a housewife to a successful fish farmer has significantly improved her family's financial situation and serves as an inspiration to others in her community.

Ranu's transformation from a housewife in a salt farmer family to a successful pond fish farmer has proven to be highly impactful. Her achievements have inspired many other salt farming families to adopt pond fish farming as a viable and profitable source of income. Local women, who were previously anxious about the declining traditional salt production, now see a light of hope in Ranu's success. The success of Mrs. Ranu Ara proofs that having enough expertise and planning, women can change the fate of their family besides doing household works.



Tilapia Fish Farming Success

The Inspiring Journey of Jahanara Begam

Mrs. Jahanara Begam's journey from a housewife to a successful Tilapia fish farmer in Boro Moheshkhali, Cox's Bazar, is truly inspiring. Since 1996, her family of six had been involved in traditional fish farming and unrefined salt production on their 100 decimal lands in Fakiraghata. However, in the past three years, the salt business has become increasingly unprofitable, resulting in financial difficulties.

In 2023, Jahanara attended a seminar organized by the Artemia for Bangladesh project, which introduced her to profitable fish farming techniques. She decided to start fish farming in a 202 square meter pond, producing 89 kilograms of fish in the first year. Jahanara's efforts not only provided for her family but also generated additional income by selling the surplus fish to neighbouring farmers and local markets with her husband's help.

This initial success motivated her to attend more workshops to further improve her production in 2024. Jahanara's transformation has inspired many local salt farming families to adopt pond fish farming as a viable and profitable alternative. She said that, "The effort of cultivating fish in the pond proves that it can contribute to family income and self-reliance."







Livelihood Improvement Project for the Forcibly Displaced Mayanmar Nationals in Bhasanchar

- 4) Rear sheep and distribute them to project participants
- 5) Monitor the health and productivity of the sheep regularly.
- 6) Re excavate the ponds to enhance aquaculture activities.
- 7) Pond fish culture and distribute them among the Rohingya beneficiaries.
- 8) Promote the cultivation of nutrient rich crops
- 9) Support income generation for project participants through cash for work initiatives.

















Empowering Rohingya Communities

Mukti Cox's Bazar's Livelihood Improvement Project in Bhasanchar

Mukti Cox's Bazar has been actively involved in Bhasanchar since 2020, focusing on GBV, sexual and reproductive health and rights, MHPSS, education, food security, and livelihood interventions. In December 2022, MCB launched the "Livelihood Improvement Project for the Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals in Bhasanchar," aiming to enhance food security and skills among 400 households.

The project utilizes approximately 6.5 acres of land across five plots (G-4, 5, 21, 22, and GP-7) near clusters 72, 73, 74, 81, 82, and 102 for home gardening, sheep rearing, and aquaculture that was assigned by the CiC office. This initiative provides opportunities for income generation and access to nutritious food like vegetables and fish. Rohingya participants engage in cash-for-work activities such as pond maintenance, land preparation for vegetable cultivation, and more, positively impacting their income.

To foster community ownership, Mukti has allocated 1.5 acres of land and provided agricultural inputs like seeds, fertilizer, and fencing materials for community-led vegetable cultivation. The project has received visits and praises from various officials, including the ARRRC, Navy officials, UNHCR, FAO, and the Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar.

By June 2024, the project had successfully produced and distributed a variety of food items, including 200 kg of Tilapia fish, 290 kg of ladies' fingers, 140 kg of red amaranth, 260 kg of ridge gourd, 190 kg of bottle gourd, 1,000 kg of sweet gourd, 120 kg of Indian spinach, 800 kg of radish, 850 kg of tomatoes, 45 kg of brinjal, 10 kg of coriander, and 50 kg of snake gourd to project participants. The Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar and ARRRC Bhasanchar as well as officials from CiC office, NGOs were present during the distribution.

Mukti Cox's Bazar believes these efforts have significantly enhanced the dietary diversity and nutritional intake of the Rohingya people. The organization plans to continue this project with its own funds for the next year.

Integrated literacy and livelihood skills development for Host and Rohingya youth in Cox's Bazar

Training for the literacy teachers and livelihoods skill trainer

on integrated pedagogy

A three-day training session was held at the Mukti Education project office in Kutupalong for literacy teachers and livelihood skills trainers involved in the "Integrated Literacy and Livelihood Skills Development for Host and Rohingya Youth in Cox's Bazar" project. The training aimed to equip participants with the skills and knowledge needed to effectively conduct functional literacy training, focusing on integrated pedagogy, facilitation roles, and assessment systems.



The session was attended by 28 participants (20 males and 8 females), including Md. Shahidul Islam from UNESCO and Md. Ashraful Haque from Mukti Cox's Bazar. It was facilitated by a master trainer from the BRAC UNESCO-supported project. During the event, the Deputy Director of the Youth Development Department and the Youth Development Officer visited, congratulated everyone, and committed to full cooperation. A pre-test and post-test exam were conducted to assess the training's effectiveness.

In his closing remarks, Mr. Bimal Chandra Dey Sarker, Chief Executive of Mukti Cox's Bazar, expressed gratitude to the participants and UNESCO representatives. He emphasized the importance of regular coordination with local authorities and highlighted the project's potential to prevent local youth from engaging in criminal activities. He concluded by wishing success to all involved and announcing the end of the training.

Organized a learning-sharing workshop



Mukti Cox's Bazar organized a Learning Sharing workshop on June 26, 2024, at the Upazila Conference Room in Ukhiya, Cox's Bazar. This event was part of the "Integrated Literacy and Livelihood Skills Development for Host and Rohingya Youth in Cox's Bazar" project. The workshop aimed to gather insights and address challenges from the project, bringing together diverse opinions from participants.

The workshop was chaired by the Honorable Upazila Nirbahi Officer, Mr. Tanvir Hossain, and included Upazila-level government officials, local government representatives, NGO and INGO delegates, UN organizations, selected beneficiaries, and the project team from Mukti Cox's Bazar. A total of 44 participants attended, including 13 females and 31 males. During the event, participants shared their opinions and acknowledged the successful completion of the project, highlighting the collaboration with camp and local authorities.

Empowering Rohingya Women and Girls Home Gardening Training and Inputs Distribution

Under the "Gender Responsive Assistance for Self-reliance of Rohingya Women and Girls in Cox's Bazar (GRAWS) Project," funded by Australian Aid and Global Affairs Canada, and supported by BRAC Pool Fund, Mukti Cox's Bazar provided two-day basic training on home gardening for the Kharif and Robi seasons. The training took place in Camp-17, with the first session from December 20, 2023, to February 2024, and the second session from April 24, 2024, to June 30, 2024. Each day, two Sub Assistant Agriculture Officers (SAAO) trained two batches of participants.

The training was inaugurated by Mr. Khaled Morshed, Lead of the BRAC Pooled Fund, along with Bablur Rahman, Government Liaison, and Md. Alauddin, PM-livelihood at BRAC, and facilitated by the Project Coordinator of the GRAWS Project. A total of 1,000 people participated, including 831 females and 169 males, with 136 adolescents among the females.

The training aimed to teach participants about Climate Smart Agriculture (CSA), its goals, and key

components. It also covered agronomic techniques, the importance and challenges of growing vegetables in the camp, and climatesmart production methods. The training focused on creating an easy and supportive learning environment, ensuring participants understood the training goals and could share their learning expectations.

This approach aimed to give participants the skills and knowledge needed for effective home gardening, tailored to the Kharif and Robi seasons. Participants also received high-quality agricultural inputs, including seeds, bamboo, seed trays, watering cans, and vermi compost. These inputs were provided to ensure they had the necessary resources to apply the skills and knowledge gained during the training effectively. By equipping participants with these essential materials, the project aimed to support sustainable home gardening practices and enhance their ability to cultivate vegetables successfully the challenging camp environment.

Rozi Akhter's Journey to Self-Reliance

Rozi Akhter, a resilient woman from a hardworking family, lived a peaceful life in Nandakhali village, Munda town, Myanmar, with her husband Jahangir Alam and their five children. Their family thrived on farming, cultivating paddy and vegetables, which provided them with a stable income and a comfortable life. However, their lives were upended when conflict erupted in Myanmar. Fearing for their safety, they fled to Bangladesh on August 25, 2017, and settled in Sub Block-74 of Block-A, Camp-17, Cox's Bazar. The initial days in the camp were challenging. Jahangir Alam struggled to find employment, making it nearly impossible to support the family with the limited rations they received. The family faced severe nutritional deficiencies, and despite the presence of various NGOs, they received no assistance for establishing a vegetable garden, which Rozi believed could help them. One day, Rozi came to know about the Livelihood Project, implemented by Mukti Cox's Bazar and supported by the BRAC Pool Fund. She eagerly contacted Delara Begum, a Field Facilitator for the project, and expressed her desire to join. After being enlisted, Rozi received training on home gardening, safeguarding, and PSEA.





She learned how to set up vertical and rooftop gardens and grow vegetables effectively. With the support and training, Rozi planted vegetable seedlings in her garden. Her dedication and regular care paid off as her garden flourished, producing an abundance of vegetables. The fresh produce not only enriched her family's diet but also provided a source of additional income. By June 2024, Rozi had harvested 120 kg of bottle gourd and 40 kg of bitter gourd, selling them for BDT 6,400. She also sold leafy vegetables (shak) for BDT 1,500 and shared some with relatives and neighbours.

With her earnings, Rozi bought four chickens, further diversifying her family's food sources and income. The vegetable garden became a vital source of nutrition and financial support, allowing Rozi to meet her own needs and contribute to family decision-making.

Rozi dreams of continuing her journey towards self-reliance with the help of Mukti Cox's Bazar. She is grateful to the project authorities and donors for their support, which has brought financial stability and happiness to her family.

Mukti Cox's Bazar's initiatives and practice regarding Safeguarding and PSEAH

Mukti Cox's Bazar has established a comprehensive code of conduct that emphasizes the prevention of PSEAH (Prevention of Sexual Exploitation, Abuse, and Harassment). The organization has implemented essential policies, including Gender Policy, PSEA Policy, Child Safeguarding Policy, Anti-Fraud Policy, Whistle Blowing Policy, and policies for HR, Financial, Procurement, Safety, and Security. The Safeguarding Policy aims to protect children, at-risk adults, and affected populations from harm during their interactions with the organization. The Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) policy safeguards all beneficiaries, including those indirectly impacted, from sexual exploitation and abuse. Additionally, the Child Safeguarding Policy specifically protects children involved in the organization's programs from all forms of abuse and exploitation.

Mukti Cox's Bazar has designated Safeguarding Focal who is responsible to address all kinds of issues related to Safeguarding. Moreover, we have project based PSEA Focal & Co- Focal who are responsible for all kinds of PSEA activities in the project with the support of Safeguarding Focal. As an active member of the PSEA network in Cox's Bazar, Mukti Cox's Bazar has contributed to the development of IEC materials and provided extensive training. The organization has a dedicated Safeguarding and PSEA unit led by a Safeguarding Focal. Mukti Cox's Bazar maintains two hotline numbers for the safeguarding focal and alternative focal to receive SEA complaints, feedback, and other concerns. Additionally, Mukti Cox's Bazar employs staff who have received certified training in SEA investigation internationally, enabling them to handle cases effectively. This robust framework ensures that the organization upholds the highest standards of protection and accountability.

Between January and June 2024, we provided Safeguarding and PSEA training to 494 staff members (152 men, 342 women), 987 Rohingya volunteers (497 men, 490 women), and 1,368 host volunteers (114 men, 1,254 women). During this period, we also conducted awareness sessions on PSEA and Child Safeguarding issues for 125,208 beneficiaries and distributed IEC materials provided by the PSEA network as needed.

Preventive Action: Every newly recruited staff member receives basic orientation on HR policy, Safeguarding policy, **PSEA** policy, Safeguarding policy, Gender policy, and the staff Code of Conduct. All staff are required to undergo training or refresher training on Safeguarding and PSEAH twice a year. Between January and June 2024, we provided Safeguarding and PSEA training to 494 staff members (152 men, 342 women), 987 Rohingya volunteers (497 men, 490 women), and 1,368 host volunteers (114 men, 1,254 women). During this period, we also conducted awareness sessions on PSEA and Safeguarding issues for 125,208 beneficiaries and distributed IEC materials provided by the PSEA network as needed.

Responsive action against complaint/feedback: Mukti Cox's Bazar takes all allegations seriously and meticulously attends to the details reported. We do not promise confidentiality, as we must inform the Safeguarding Focal Person and relevant investigators if an investigation is initiated. All safeguarding notifications have been managed confidentially to protect the identities of those involved, in accordance with data protection laws and sector standards. Safeguarding Focal Person ensures each project office maintains an updated local safeguarding resource and referral list annually.

MAINSTREAMING DISABILITY Vis Bazar is deeply committed to ensuring the INCLUSION

Mukti Cox's Bazar is deeply committed to ensuring the inclusion of persons with disabilities, the elderly, and other diverse groups in all its interventions. In the design phase of each project, Mukti Cox's Bazar sets a target to include 5-10 percent of persons with disabilities. This commitment is reflected through both targeted and mainstream interventions aimed at enhancing access to services and upholding the dignity of these individuals. To achieve these goals, Mukti Cox's Bazar has appointed dedicated Age and Disability Inclusion focal persons and project-based disability inclusion officers. These professionals work tirelessly to identify and reduce barriers, thereby increasing the participation of persons with disabilities and the elderly in all programs. Their efforts are integral to fostering an inclusive environment where everyone, regardless of their abilities or age, can actively participate and benefit from the organization's initiatives.

Mukti Cox's Bazar employs the Washington Group Short Set questionnaire and the Washington Group Child Functioning Module during beneficiary selection to accurately identify and include persons with disabilities in their projects. The organization has implemented numerous capacity-building initiatives for its staff and volunteers, focusing on disability inclusion, accessibility, and communication etiquette. Through its projects, Mukti Cox's Bazar assists persons with disabilities in identifying and referring their concerns to other service providers, ensuring continuous follow-up to guarantee that their needs are met. During the reporting period, the organization provided services to over 25,000 persons with disabilities in both the camps and the local community.

Mukti Cox's Bazar collaborates with disability-focused organizations to change the attitudes of parents and caregivers who previously did not send their children to school or learning centers due to impairments. We motivate these families by showcasing the accessible and positive learning environments available within the FDMN camps and host communities learning center. For Gender-Based Violence interventions, Mukti Cox's Bazar provides a range of services for persons with disabilities, including referrals, psychosocial support services, social services activities, GBV awareness programs, dignity kit distribution, health services, and livelihood support. Mukti Cox's Bazar distribute assistive technologies including wheel chair, spectacles etc. to person with disabilities and aged people. Mukti Cox's Bazar collaborates with Organizations of Persons Disabilities (OPDs) and Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) to enhance their leadership and advocacy skills. This partnership aims to strengthen their capacity to support individuals with disabilities. Additionally, Mukti Cox's Bazar assists in ensuring that all persons with disabilities are registered with the social welfare department through combined advocacy with OPDs. Through these efforts, Mukti Cox's Bazar not only empowers OPDs and CBOs but also ensures that persons with disabilities receive the recognition and support they deserve from social welfare services. This comprehensive approach helps to build a more inclusive and supportive community for all.

ENVIRONMENT, CLIMATE CHANGE and DISASTER MANAGEMENT

Bangladesh, home to 160 million people, is highly vulnerable to the impacts of global warming and climate change, particularly in its coastal zones. Recognizing major hazards like floods, cyclones, and rising salinity, Mukti Cox's Bazar has implemented disaster risk reduction projects to mitigate these effects. Although there were no direct climate change projects during this reporting period, Mukti Cox's Bazar has taken various initiatives in Cox's Bazar. In 2023-24, the organization focused on enhancing livelihoods, food security, health, forest and Agro-biodiversity, community resilience, and coastal natural resource management. Mukti Cox's Bazar engaged communities climate-adaptive agriculture. developed climate-smart villages, and conducted tree plantations in both host and FDMN camps with support from PKSF, Oxfam in Bangladesh, and IVY Japan.

Mukti Cox's Bazar maintains a contingency fund of 1 million BDT to respond to disaster-affected communities during and after crises. The organization also designs emergency support projects to distribute relief and facilitate recovery operations.

During cyclone Remal, Mukti Cox's Bazar handed over 500 packets of food and non-food items to the district administration, including dry food, liquid milk, water, candles, matchboxes, 50 torchlights, and raincoats for the emergency relief rescue operation team. The district administration expressed their gratitude for Mukti Cox's Bazar's rapid support and partnership in providing emergency relief assistance. Additionally, Mukti Cox's Bazar supported the strengthening of disaster management committees at the Ward, Union, Upazila, and District levels.

FDMN Rohingya Crisis

From 2017 to 2024, Mukti Cox's Bazar has been at the forefront of humanitarian efforts in the Cox's Bazar area, particularly in response to the massive influx of Rohingyas on August 25, 2017. As a pioneering organization, Mukti Cox's Bazar promptly provided emergency humanitarian aid, including food, drinking water, sanitation, health services, and gender-based violence (GBV) support to the forcibly displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMNs). Additionally, Mukti Cox's Bazar focused on education for the FDMN children. Initially, Mukti Cox's Bazar began its interventions with food security and livelihood projects in the Ukhiya and Teknaf sub-districts of Cox's Bazar. As the crisis evolved and the demand for humanitarian support grew, the organization expanded its projects from September 2017, with the support of the Bangladesh government and various donors.

the support of the Bangladesh government and various donors.

Their efforts emphasized emergency support, food security, livelihood, youth mobilization, water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH), disaster risk reduction (DRR), nutrition, environmental protection, and education.

Throughout the reporting year, Mukti Cox's Bazar reached 711,223 FDMNs across 33 camps and Bhasanchar, providing extensive protection, GBV in Emergencies (GBViE) support, education, health services, food security, nutrition, livelihood and skills development, and environmental protection. These efforts were coordinated with various sectors, working groups, sub-sectors, networks, the Camp-in-Charge (CIC), and the Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commissioner (RRRC) office.

Networking and Coordination

Mukti Cox's Bazar fosters strong coordination and collaborative relationships with a wide array of stakeholders, including government entities, the Inter-Sector Coordination Group (ISCG), various sectors, sub-sectors, and working groups. The organization maintains professional partnerships and networking with the Refugee Relief and Repatriation Commissioner (RRRC), local administration at Rohingya refugee camps, and authorities at the upazila, district, and divisional levels.

Mukti Cox's Bazar is an active member of numerous networks such as ADAB, ISCG, CCNF, NGO Platform, NGO Forum, START Network, Access Working Group, CSDF, ATSEC, KHAN Foundation, ANTAR, NAC, UNCC, BEST, and CAB. These affiliations enable the organization to enhance its collaborative efforts and broaden its impact. The organization ensures the involvement and participation of local authorities and beneficiaries in its decision-making processes. This approach strengthens transparency and accountability in implementing strategies, aligning with Mukti's vision, mission, and values.

Mukti Cox's Bazar plays a pivotal role in various sectors and working groups based in Cox's Bazar, including Livelihood and Skill Development (LSDS), Food Security Sector (FSS), Health and WASH, Gender in Humanitarian Action (GiHA), Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA), Safeguarding, Cox's Bazar Civil Society Organization Network (CCNF), Community-Based Health Services, Women and Child-Friendly Hospital, and the CHA Network Germany. Through these engagements, Mukti contributes significantly to the development and well-being of the communities it serves.

ADVOCACY and GOVERNANCE

Mukti Cox's Bazar has consistently engaged in policy advocacy to drive sustainable changes across various sectors. The organization has contributed to sectoral policy formulation and reformation, influencing both government and private sectors. Throughout the reporting years, Mukti Cox's Bazar has organized numerous advocacy workshops from the Union Parishad to the district level, focusing on transformative women empowerment, sustainable livelihood and market linkage, disaster risk reduction, and climate change adaptation.

The organization actively participates in round table discussions, workshops, and meetings with international organizations and donors, strongly advocating for localization and the release of funds for the Forcibly Displaced Myanmar Nationals (FDMN) and host communities. Mukti Cox's Bazar has also strengthened Community-Based Organizations (CBOs) to effectively advocate for upholding rights and dignity. As part of its advocacy efforts, Mukti Cox's Bazar celebrates significant days such as World Environment Day, World Health Day, International Women's Day, and Global Handwashing Day in a festive manner, involving relevant stakeholders at both national and regional levels.

Central services and organizational strength

The success of Mukti Cox's Bazar's strategy for each sector is dependent upon the essential support of the central services. The Central service is directly in service of implementing of the projects. There are different central service units. The objective of Mukti Cox's Bazar's organizational strengthening program is to ensure that the level of essential support from the central services meets the need of organization as it grows to raise the goals and objectives targeted in the sectors. The main activities of the central services, whose staffs work frequently in the field, as well as in the central offices, are:

Field Operations:

Mukti Cox's Bazar organizes and manages field visits including all required arrangements for personnel, donor's, volunteers, and guests. Guides and assists program staffs in all aspects of the set- up, implementation and completion of projects. Builds working relationships with the local govt. administration, local government bodies and the community. Provides emergency and crisis management in times of natural or man-made disasters. Manages and maintains organizational field offices and Training Centers including security. Manages and maintains all types of organizational assets in Field offices. Collection of project activity certificate from local administration as well as local authority for individual project in each year. Develop regular visit schedule and ensure necessary logistics and security for National, International and Donors Visitors.

Administrative Management

It has emphasized that personnel management is one of the important activities of the organization. Considering the output of human resources, a careful attention is given for improving quality of work life, productivity improvement and readiness for change. The four HRM functions i.e. staff acquisition, staff development; staff motivation and staff maintenance are performed by competent personnel. It has very clear and concise policies and procedures manual which describe all HRM functions. Along with financial and administrative policies, the HR policies are contributing in developing financial transparency of the organization. Experience and trained human resources are the main strength of the organization. It has a long time experienced professional staffs as well as promising dedicated development professionals in the team. Teams consist of diversified knowledge and skilled persons e.g. social science graduates, agriculturist, health professional and technologist, economic and financial analyst, etc. Mukti Cox's Bazar provides fundamental (basic) and refresher training based on training need assessment to build capacity of the staff members for social mobilization, health care, water and sanitation, economic empowerment through IGA, etc. It maintains two categories of staffs namely permanent and project staffs.

Human Resources Management:

Mukti Cox's Bazar places significant emphasis on personnel management, recognizing it as a critical organizational activity. Given the importance of human resources, the organization is dedicated to enhancing the quality of work life, boosting productivity, and fostering adaptability to change. The four core HRM functions—staff acquisition, staff development, staff motivation, and staff management—are meticulously executed by skilled HR professionals. The organization has established clear and concise Human Resource policy and procedures that comprehensively outline all HRM functions. These HR policy, alongside financial and administrative policies, play a crucial role in promoting transparency within the organization.

The strength of Mukti Cox's Bazar lies in its experienced and well-trained human resources. The team comprises seasoned professionals and dedicated development experts, bringing together a diverse range of knowledge and skills, including social sciences, agriculture, healthcare, economics, and financial analysis. Mukti Cox's Bazar has software-based HR management system named Smart Software.

To ensure continuous capacity building, Mukti Cox's Bazar conducts foundation and refresher training sessions based on training needs assessments. These sessions aim to enhance staff capabilities in areas such as Code of conduct and policies, social mobilization, gender, protection, safeguarding, PSEA, CFRM etc. The organization mainly maintains two categories of staff: regular and project based and other four categories' staffs as like as Consultant, Temporary, Fixed Term Contract for Trainee and Casual. This structured approach to human resources management ensures that Mukti Cox's Bazar remains agile, effective, and committed to its mission of sustainable development and community empowerment.

The HR Department used for organising a new hire's basic induction for the entire day. This included a thorough orientation about the organization's history, mission, vision, and core values as well as its programs and projects. It also covered key management and operational policies, safeguarding, PSEA, child protection, gender, and HR rules, regulations, and obligations, including pay and benefit packages, systems, and procedures. In addition, there will be debriefing sessions with the Chief Executive and briefings from the leaders of key departments and programs during the induction process. There are currently five full-time employees in the HR & Admin Department that are devoted and committed headed by a Director. In total, 640 employees were hired by the department in the previous fiscal year (193 males and 443 women).

The HR & Admin department will make sure that PSEAH and safeguarding training/orientation are required for all Mukti Cox's Bazar employees.HR and Admin also will work together to promptly arrange project-based training.

Financial Management:

Mukti Cox's Bazar has the financial technical and administrative capacity to assume the responsibility for mobilizing and applying effectively and efficiently the required inputs in order to reach the expected outputs and goal or the organization. Mukti Cox's Bazar assumes overall financial management responsibility and accountability for core programme, MCAP and all development projects are being implementing. Accordingly, Mukti Cox's Bazar must follow the internal control framework effectively and efficiently including all policies and procedures established for its own operations. Mukti Cox's Bazar is committed to establishing a comprehensive 360° accountability and transparency system in financial management, strictly adhering to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) for recording, analysing, reporting, and closing accounts. The organization upholds a clear and accessible financial policy for daily accounting and reporting, reinforced by robust practices as outlined in MUKTI's policies and guidance documents. To ensure meticulous financial management, Mukti Cox's Bazar is being implementing cloud base ERP QuickBooks for managing effective and efficient internal control on financial management. Besides our Micro Credit Assistance Program (MCAP) implementing ERP G-Banker for effective financial management. As Mukti Cox's Bazar is committed to implement as much as possible cash less this transactions and circumstances we are ensuring NPSB/EFT/BEFTN/RTGS transfer and Account Payee Cheque for all programme, MCAP and Development Programme. We are ensuring effective and efficient financial management review process, effective field visit and physical verification process also to ensure effective internal control framework. Including mother account, provident fund, gratuity and each project maintains separate books of accounts, bank accounts spread across Cox's Bazar, Chattogram, Noakhali, and Bandarban districts.

In the context of ERP base accounting system QuickBooks is being implementing by the Mukti Cox's Bazar provides the effective and efficient management information system to ensure accuracy and transparency of financial information and internal control framework. The Mukti Cox's Bazar is using the cloud base ERPs to keep track of the financial status of the Mother Account, MCAP and all development projects at all times, to control expenses; handle outstanding commitments; make payments; and monitor the performance of contractors. Cloud base ERPs shall be used for both financial management and substantive monitoring. This will enable the production of reports that are part of Mukti Cox's Bazar central oversight and monitoring while serving as the building blocks for periodic reviews and communications with stakeholders and all development donors reporting. Any adjustments to the initial approved budget shall be reflected as budgetary revisions in cloud base ERPs which to be finalized for the year(s) affected by the adjustment. Besides Mukit Cox's Bazar also efficiently managing Cloud base ERP QUANTUM of UNFPA for E FACE management for submission Financial Expenditure report, Fund Request and programmatic report as well budgetary control.

Monitoring and Evaluation

Mukti Cox's Bazar (MCB) has a robust Monitoring, Evaluation, Accountability, and Learning (MEAL) department that plays a crucial role in supporting the organization's core programs and projects funded by various partners and donors. The MEAL department operates within a well-defined framework, developing comprehensive Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) plans for each project. These plans guide the department's regular monitoring activities. The MEAL team is responsible for conducting periodic data collection and analysis based on established standards to ensure transparency and accountability. This process helps management assess whether key activities are being implemented as planned and identify any factors hindering the achievement of expected outcomes. Most of MCB's programs and projects are designed to contribute to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

In addition to monitoring, the MEAL department is dedicated to establishing Complaint and Feedback Response Mechanisms (CFRM) at both the project and office levels. During the 2023-24 period, the department conducted numerous monitoring visits using specific checklists and delivered detailed monitoring reports to the Chief Executive and project/program management teams. These reports covered all core programs, and projects.

Furthermore, the MEAL department conducted and supported various assessments, including baseline assessments, endline evaluations, and Post Distribution Monitoring (PDM) for projects in collaboration with supporting partners. The findings from these monitoring activities were compiled into comprehensive reports, which facilitated quick remedial actions for the respective programs and projects. Mukti Cox's Bazar (MCB) consistently publishes a quarterly newsletter titled "Prottay." In addition to this, MCB produces a variety of digital content, including digital lessons and Mojakids. The organization also releases an annual report and creates various promotional materials such as festoons, leaflets, and brochures. By continuously refining its processes and ensuring rigorous monitoring and evaluation, the MEAL department at MCB significantly contributes to the organization's mission of promoting sustainable development and positive change in the community.

Information Management Systems (MIS)

Management Information System (MIS) of Mukti Cox's has been combined with fully integrated management information system application software through fully equipped data center i.e., servers, storages, etc. At present, employers have been able to serve the clients more efficiently with the support of these technologies by reducing paper-work based tasks. Uses of Technology have increased the accessibility to information and have simplified the computations of complex analyses. Financial Information Systems (FIS) has been using the access and have analyzed the financial information more efficiently for ensuring better decision-making, cost budgeting and cost center management, report generation and database query/ analysis capacity. All the branches of Mukti Cox have been brought under the full automation coverage already and have been connected with the head office. Data collects and collated from the Sectors and Central Service Units as well as generates reports for the use of Management and other stakeholders. Develops and maintains certain specialist software. Manages all aspects of Mukti Cox's Bazar IT infrastructure, including acquisition and maintenance of hardware, internet connectivity, firewalls, and security and back-up systems.

Internal Audit

For ensuring internal control and donor compliance Internal Audit periodically review project expenditure and report to Chief Executive. Objective of the internal audit to ensure project office full compliance with both donor and organizational policy and procedure, establish sound financial management, minimize risk of Fraud, theft, and misuse of fund. Besides, Mukti Cox's Bazar conducts audit of accounts by the approved professional auditors each year. There are no significant reports on misappropriation and fraud regarding any of our programs/projects so far. It has established internal control structures through ensuring control environment, risk assessment, control activities, monitoring, and communication. Segregation of duties made appropriately by three different functions such as financial transactions recording, custodian, and authorizing roles. There are independent Monitoring and auditing departments directly reportable to Chief Executive of the organization.

The services of the department include routine system and special audits, investigations, and annual inventory verification.

In the reporting year, the internal audit team has conducted 85 audit visits and submitted the reports to CE.

Three major accomplishments of MCB Internal Audit team are:

- ·Have assesses the efficiency and effectiveness of the internal control system
- ·Have rationalized the implementation strategy in line with the organizational policies and systems;
- ·Have verified the accounting records and relevant information.

Procurement and Regulatory Compliances

Mukti Cox's Bazar is expected to follow mainly centralized procurement strategy with a provision for procurement at area/field level to meet the day-to-day requirement, emergencies and purchase of food and perishable items. A procurement committee is playing proactive roles to manage the requisitions of purchase for all the Programs implemented by Mukti Cox. Throughout the entire process it follows the procurement guidelines and implementation procedures of Mukti Cox which are transparent and developed in line with international procurement standard. All required procure is completed as per the policy which included the following procedure-Fair Competition, Conflict of Interest, Cost-effectiveness, Transparency and Public Accountability. Mukti Cox's is maintaining three types of procedures to procure such as Open Tendering, Restricted or Single Tendering and General Procurement. All procurement process is monitoring by monitoring team and report to Executive Committee via Chief Executive.

Partnership development

MCB maintains dynamic networks with national and international agencies, policymakers, civil society, and resource-sharing partners. The organization aims to expand these collaborations and seek strategic alliances at local, national, and international levels. This approach enhances advocacy efforts, influences policy and practices, and strengthens MCB's visibility and presence in policy dialogues. Through these alliances, MCB engages in knowledge sharing and demonstrates its unique advantages, furthering its mission and impact. By participating in various meetings, workshops, seminars, and conferences, MCB strengthens its partnerships and communication systems. The team collaborates with different sectors to maintain effective communication with existing and potential donors, coordinate fundraising activities, and ensure high-quality proposal submission.

Organizational Sustainability

Achieving sustainability in all its forms—financial, economic, social, and environmental—is a complex challenge for development programs. Mukti Cox's Bazar (MCB) is committed to becoming a self-reliant organization and has planned to initiate several revenue-generating activities such as Mukti Resource Center (MRC), Social business etc. However, the organization still relies on external support for most of its interventions. To enhance economic development and organizational sustainability, MCB has implemented a Microfinance Assistance Program. MCB's approach to sustainability focuses on both programmatic and economic aspects. The organization believes that sustainability is rooted in its development strategies, which include participatory needs assessments in program design, institutional presence and capacity-building, fostering participation and linkages, and promoting self-reliance. By adhering to these principles, MCB aims to secure long-term sustainability for its programs and organizational operations.

Governance and Management

Mukti Cox's Bazar employs a two-tier decision-making structure to ensure efficient organizational operations. The organization is guided by a General Committee (GC) of 21 members and an Executive Committee of 7 members, both comprising esteemed professionals, social activists, and entrepreneurs. Additionally, an Advisory Committee Comprising distinguished professionals hailing from the very heart of Cox's Bazar district, this assembly embodies a wealth of knowledge, experience, and commitment. As the sun rises over the Bay of Bengal, so does the Advisory Board's influence. Their names resonate—a symphony of dedication, echoing through the corridors of empowerment. They are the architects of resilience, the custodians of hope. The Chief Executive is tasked with the sole responsibility of executing approved programs and projects.

General Committee

The General Committee (GC) is the highest policy-making body within Mukti Cox's Bazar, consisting of 21 members. This committee convenes annually to deliberate on crucial matters that shape the organization's future. The primary functions of the GC include formulating organizational policies, approving the annual budget, and reviewing past activities and achievements. The decisions made by the GC significantly influence the overall direction and strategic priorities of Mukti Cox's Bazar.

In addition to these responsibilities, the GC elects 7 members to the Executive Committee (EC) for a term of three years, ensuring a robust governance structure. During the reporting year, the General Committee held two important meetings: the Annual General Meeting (AGM) in August 2023 and a Special General Meeting in April 2024. These meetings provided a platform for indepth discussions, evaluations, and decision-making, reinforcing the GC's pivotal role in guiding the organization's mission and objectives.

Executive Committee (EC)

The Executive Committee (EC) of Mukti Cox's Bazar, comprising 7 members elected by the General Committee, plays a dual role. They are actively involved in executing the organization's activities and contributing to strategic decisions about its future direction and potential expansion areas. The EC approves various projects and programs, the annual budget, annual reports, and audit reports, and formulates guidelines, manuals, and policies. They regularly monitor and analyze implementation progress and provide directives. In the 2023-2024 financial year, the Executive Committee held a total of 6 meetings.

Senior Management Committee (SMC):

The Senior Management Committee (SMC), led by the Chief Executive, comprises 11 senior-level staff members. As the second tier of decision-making and supervisory body within Mukti Cox's Bazar, the SMC shapes organizational policies. Its pivotal role lies in aligning the organization programme and projects with its mission and achieving impactful outcomes. Specifically, the SMC supports the Chief Executive in developing detailed operational plans and implementing the strategic vision of Mukti Cox's Bazar.

Participatory Management Committee (PMC)

The PMC is an inter-sectoral coordination committee, also known as the Participatory Management Committee. It includes members from various departments, such as Project Coordinators (PCs), Field Coordinators (FCs), and Sector Focal Points. This committee meets monthly to discuss the current situation, progress, challenges, learnings, and recommendations related to program or project management. Additionally, administrative and management issues are addressed during these meetings.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of **Mukti Cox's Bazar** pertaining to **Development & Humanitarian Activities**, which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Position as at June 30, 2024 and Consolidated Statement of Income and Expenditure and Consolidated Statement of Receipts and Payments for the year ended on that date, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of **Mukti Cox's Bazar** pertaining to **Development & Humanitarian Activities** as at June 30, 2024, and its financial performance and its receipts and payments for the year then ended.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the organization in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the IESBA Code and the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Bangladesh (ICAB) Bye Laws. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of management and those charged with governance for the financial statements.
